County proposes update to Sugarloaf Livable Centers Initiative Master Plan

The Gwinnett County Board of Commissioners in February voted to propose an update to the Sugarloaf Livable Centers Initiative Master Plan. The proposed plan update will focus on re-establishing land use recommendations, identifying infrastructure improvements, and supporting creative placemaking efforts. The project has an estimated budget of \$350,000, with a required 20% local match of \$70,000. The Sugarloaf Community Improvement District will partner with the County on the project, splitting the local match so that the County's portion will be \$35,000. If approved by the Atlanta Regional Commission, the planning process will include opportunities for community engagement and stakeholder input. Learn more at GwinnettCounty.com.

Tax Assessors' Office issue Real Estate Property Annual Notices of Assessment

Most Residential and Commercial Annual Notices of Assessment for 2025 will be mailed and available online at Gwinnett-Assessor.com in May. An Annual Notice of Assessment is not a tax bill. The notice informs you of the value assessed on your residential or commercial real estate as of January 1, 2025. Property owners may appeal the assessed value within 45 days of the date of the notice by submitting a completed PT-311A state appeal form online or by mail. Mailed-in forms must be received or postmarked within 45 days of the date of your notice. If you choose to mail in the form, it is recommended to send the documents with a trackable method to confirm delivery. For questions, call 770.822.7200.

Seniors may qualify for emission exemptions

If you are age 65 or older, a registered owner of a vehicle with a model year of 2015 or older, and drive less than 5,000 miles a year, you may be eligible for an emission inspection exemption. Stay safe at the pool and around water

The summer season means warmer weather and an increase in outdoor recreational activities like swimming, boating, and more. Accidental drownings are tragic reminders of how quickly life can be taken away. Follow these tips to ensure your safety and the safety of others in or around water:

- Read and follow all posted pool rules
- Stay alert and never leave children unattended near water
- Take swim lessons at Gwinnett's aquatic centers
- Learn lifesaving skills like CPR
- Avoid swimming while tired or under the influence of alcohol or sleep-inducing medications
- Never swim alone

SPLOST

Improvements coming to Sugarloaf Parkway

Beginning this spring, Gwinnett County will embark on a project to enhance traffic flow and safety at the intersection of Sugarloaf Parkway and US 29/State Route 8/Lawrenceville Highway. Dual left turn lanes will be added to both approaches to Sugarloaf Parkway, and the southbound right turn lane will be extended. In addition to these improvements, the area will be enhanced with traffic signal upgrades, new sidewalks, curb and gutter, and drainage upgrades. The \$2.3 million project will use funds from the 2017 SPLOST program and is anticipated to be completed by early 2026.

Burn ban in effect through September 30

To protect air quality, the state Environmental Protection Division imposes a metrowide burn ban every year from May 1 through September 30. All types of outdoor or open burning are prohibited, including burning trees, limbs, and yard waste, as well as the use of air curtain destructors.
