It is estimated that, for the average household, the questionnaire will take about 10 minutes to complete. Our response rate will help determine if Georgia gains another seat in the US House of Representatives as well as our portion of an estimated \$400 billion in federal funding distributed to communities each year. Local streams, rivers suffer from minor pollution sources

Death by a thousand cuts was an ancient method of torture and execution where the unfortunate recipient was subjected to 1,000 small cuts all over his or her body. Each cut was small enough that, while painful, could have been easily treated without any long-term consequences. However, when combined with 999 similar wounds, the effect was deadly.

So, what does this have to do with us today? Well, Gwinnett's streams and rivers face a similar death by a thousand cuts each day, and each one of us holds the knife.

You would hardly affect your local stream if you were the only one in your area washing your car in the driveway, poisoning weeds in the gutter, spilling fertilizer into the street, or not picking up after your pet. But you are not alone. There are thousands of others out there just like you doing the same things, and our waterways end up suffering a proverbial death by a thousand cuts as a result.

Storm drains are designed to stop flooding by quickly moving rainwater from roads, parking lots, and other areas into streams. County ordinances prohibit the use of storm drains for disposal of anything other than rainwater and provide penalties for violation. If you know of or see individuals involved in dumping or discharging wastes into storm drains or onto the ground, please report it to the Stormwater Management Division by calling 678.376.7000.

Gwinnett Stops: Red light cameras stay on alert

Red light cameras will continue monitoring several Gwinnett intersections and recording moving violations by motorists caught in the intersection after their light has turned red. The Board of Commissioners in January approved a new contract with American Traffic Solutions, Inc. of Scottsdale, Arizona, for \$140.533.

The company installed the existing systems at the intersections of Jimmy Carter Boulevard and Singleton Road in 2005, Mall of Georgia Boulevard at Buford Drive/State Route 20 in 2008, and Steve Reynolds Boulevard at Beaver Ruin Road/ State Route 378 in 2009.

Gwinnett Police Chief Charles Walters reminded drivers that "a yellow light means prepare to stop." He said red light cameras have proven effective in reducing serious accidents at problem intersections. The three cameras are expected to more than cover their cost of operation by bringing in as much as \$300,000 in revenue this year. "Public safety is far more important than the revenue," said Walters. "Protecting lives is our main priority."

SPLOST

Police Annex and E-911 center opens

The new Police Annex is home to the County's E-911 communications center, emergency operations center, and backup data center. The project came in with a lower price tag and two months ahead of schedule.

The one-story, 45,000-square-foot Police Annex and E-911 Center construction began in September 2008 and was completed in November 2009. Competitive market conditions permitted the County to reduce the original total project budget from \$20 million to \$18.7 million.



"The police annex will provide Gwinnett County with a state-of-the-art facility that will serve the County well for the many years to come," said Commission Chairman **Charles E. Bannister.** "The relocation of the 911 center and its personnel from police headquarters will make room for more law enforcement operations to occupy the extra space."

The building and associated parking will accommodate 180 employees and was designed to meet standards for hardened facilities utilizing FEMA 361 guidelines. The pre-cast concrete was a natural envelope material for accommodating facility hardening required by FEMA 361.

The project was not required to have a LEED certification; however, the design team, led by architect Michael Katzin of HOK (Hellmuth, Obata, and Kassabaum, Inc.), used a sustainable design approach to provide an environmentally responsible facility. Some of the sustainable design approaches for this project included minimized site disturbance and light pollution, water-efficient landscaping, low VOC materials, low-flow plumbing fixtures, and digital HVAC controls.

The general contractor for the project was Manhattan Construction Co. Funding for the project was provided by the Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax (SPLOST) and police capital project funds.

AROUND GWINNETT

Engage Gwinnett committee studies desired services and funding mechanisms

Since September 2009, 42 citizen leaders representing stakeholder groups and the community at-large have been involved in a community engagement initiative called *Engage Gwinnett: Committee on the Future of Gwinnett County.* The committee has been tasked with studying government services and recommending to the Board of Commissioners desired service levels and funding strategies for the next five years. This citizen-led initiative is a partnership between Gwinnett County government and the Gwinnett Chamber of Commerce.

Engage Gwinnett committee meetings are held every two weeks at the Gwinnett Center in Duluth and are open to the public. Members hear from elected officials, County staff, and local residents, and participate in group discussions.
