Recycle 35 items in the new Solid Waste Management Plan

Starting July 1, 2010, unincorporated Gwinnett County will be divided into five service areas as part of the new Solid Waste Management Plan. Each service area will be provided with one hauler, making solid waste service more efficient, cost effective, and environmentally friendly. This new plan applies only to households in unincorporated areas of Gwinnett County and does not affect city residents.

Under the new plan, homeowners will have the opportunity to recycle 35 different items as part of their regular solid waste pick-up service.

PROTECTING OUR RESOURCES

Carwashes, pools, and sprinklers, oh my!

As the weather warms up, we spend more time outside washing the car, bathing the dog, filling the pool, and watering the lawn. As you use more water outdoors, please keep water conservation in the forefront of your mind. Here are some suggestions that will help you do so:

- Use a commercial car wash that recycles water or wash your car on the lawn and you'll water your lawn at the same time
- Install covers on pools and spas to prevent evaporation and check for leaks. To check, use a grease pencil to mark the water level of your pool at the skimmer. Check the mark 24 hours later to see if the water level dropped. If it did, you may have a leak
- Spread a layer of organic mulch around plants to retain moisture in the soil and save water, time, and money
- Adjust sprinklers so only your lawn is watered and not the house, sidewalk, or street
- Install a rain sensor on the sprinklers' irrigation controller so the system won't run when it's raining
- Water lawns or gardens before 10:00am or after 4:00pm when temperatures are cooler to reduce evaporation
- Your lawn only needs one inch of water per week, and the water can come from rain or your sprinkler

SPLOST

SPLOST: Freeman's Mill Park opens

An old gristmill that resides along the banks of the Alcovy River is now the focal point of the County's newest park. **Freeman's Mill Park** features a playground that replicates a gristmill, picnic pavilion, half-mile multi-purpose trail, parking, restroom facilities, and the historic Freeman's gristmill. The County purchased the mill and surrounding property in 2002 with funding from the Georgia Greenspace Program and the 2005 SPLOST.

In 2009, the County raised and restored the mill and its surrounding 12 acres for educational and recreational use to offer Gwinnett County citizens a sense of the agricultural past. The mill was built sometime between 1868 and 1879 by brothers John Griffin and Levi J. Loveless. By 1996, it was said to be one of only 15 mills in the state in working order and the only one in Gwinnett County. At that time it was placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

In 1913, W. Scott Freeman and his son, Winfield, owned it until it was purchased in 1915 by Newt Pharr. Winfield descendants continued to operate the mill through the 20th century.

Freeman's Mill played an important role in the local community in early Gwinnett County. Local farmers would bring their wheat and corn to the miller to be turned into flour and meal. Alcova Baptist Church, located up the street from the mill, used the mill pond for baptisms and the millhouse itself provided a gathering place for the surrounding rural community. The water-powered gristmill was preferred by many farmers because it would grind the corn more slowly than electric mills, resulting in a sweeter taste.

Single Family Residential rates per 1,000 gallons

Tier 1 (up to 8,000 gallons): \$4.11

Tier 2 (8,001 to 12,000 gallons): \$6.16

Tier 3 (12,001 gallons and over): \$8.22
