New senior center offers one-stop services to residents

In December, Gwinnett County and federal officials opened the new Gwinnett Senior Services Center at 567 Swanson Drive in Lawrenceville. The one-story facility is designed as a LEED Silver building to maximize energy use and water conservation. The center has two community rooms for educational programs and meetings. Staff is easily accessible to match seniors and their caregivers with available resources, and volunteers can sign up for service projects.

Wastewater 101

When water leaves your home, apartment, or workplace, it goes to one of two locations: the sanitary sewer system or a septic tank. If the wastewater goes to the sanitary sewer system, it will pass from the source to a wastewater treatment facility. The wastewater treatment facility will clean the water and release the treated water (or effluent) into a nearby stream, river, or lake. Water that does not flow into the sanitary sewer system is treated by an onsite waste water management system, commonly called a septic system.



A typical septic system is made up of a septic tank and a drain field (or absorption field). The septic tank is an underground watertight container built to receive wastewater and allow solids to settle out before sending the liquids to the drain field. This system uses nature's physical, chemical, and biological processes to clean the wastewater. If designed, installed, and maintained properly, a septic system can be a cost-effective, safe, and efficient way to dispose of wastewater. However, just like painting your home or fixing a leaky roof, the maintenance of a septic system is up to the homeowner. Failing to maintain your system can have a negative impact on your system, your wallet, and the environment.

Gwinnett has one of the highest concentrations of septic systems in the United States, with over 75,000 of these systems spread throughout the county. A failure to maintain your septic system can lead to an overflow of raw sewage, which can flow to a creek, storm drain, or cause a backup into your house. Leaking septic systems along with several other sources of fecal bacteria (such as pet waste and some agricultural facilities) have impaired 196 miles of Gwinnett's streams so that they do not meet the standards set by Georgia's Environmental Protection Division. As a minimum maintenance requirement, it is recommended that homeowners have their septic tanks pumped every three to five years. This simple maintenance step removes the collected solids and prevents them from overflowing into and clogging the drain lines connected to the septic tank. This simple action will help you avoid risking your health and the health of others by finding sewage in your bathtub or a wastewater lagoon in your yard.

SPLOST

Gwinnett approves sidewalks and more

Design improvements to the intersection of Jimmy Carter Boulevard at Buford Highway will be underway soon after Gwinnett commissioners approved three contracts with two Community Improvement Districts (CIDs) in December.

An agreement with the Gwinnett Village CID allows the district to study feasibility and designs to accommodate increased capacity, improve safety, and minimize congestion at the intersection. Resurfacing of Indian Trail Road is covered by a second agreement with the same CID.

The Gwinnett Place CID will add sidewalks on Sweetwater Road, Koger Boulevard, Steve Reynolds Boulevard, Old Norcross Road, Venture Drive, and Pineland Road. Sidewalks on Ross Road will be the result of an innovative pilot project for a combined design/build contract awarded to ISC, Inc., for \$299,180. The County also awarded a construction contract for sidewalks in the Gwinnett Center area on Sugarloaf Parkway and Satellite Boulevard. An agreement with the Georgia DOT for a Livable Centers Initiative (LCI) grant will provide just under \$1.1 million toward the construction cost.

"The money for these projects has been collected through the 2009 SPLOST program, and those funds have allowed us to receive grant funding for one of the projects," said Gwinnett DOT Director **Brian Allen**.
