Cleaning up the litter in our community

Where does our trash go? The obvious answer is a landfill, but does all waste really make it there? Just take a look at the road shoulder or a stream bank and you'll see that litter exists everywhere. Litter poses a threat to wildlife, human health, and flood control.

To alleviate this problem, Gwinnett County adopted the *Illicit Discharge and Illegal Connection Ordinance* giving the County authority to investigate claims of

Residents can do their part by participating in one of these two volunteer programs, *Adopta-Road* or *Rivers Alive*, to clean up the trash in their neighborhoods. Pedestrian safety

Now that school is back in session, there are a lot more people walking in our neighborhoods and around schools. As drivers and pedestrians, it is our responsibility to know the laws pertaining to pedestrian safety.

Drivers:

- Always yield to pedestrians in a crosswalk
- Be careful at intersections when making right turns on red: 90 percent of pedestrians die if hit by a car at 40mph, compared to 5 percent at 20mph
- Use caution when driving where people gather, like neighborhoods and parks

Pedestrians:

- Be sure to cross the street at crosswalks
- In the absence of pedestrian signals, cross with the green light. In the presence of pedestrian signals, start crossing with the WALK light after looking both ways. The driver may also have a green light
- If there is no sidewalk, walk along the shoulder, facing traffic

Park projects approved for Harbins and Rabbit Hill

New facilities are coming to the County's largest park, Harbins Park east of Grayson. The park will have a multi-purpose field with bleachers, a concession/restroom building, and a lighted walking track. There will also be a rental pavilion, a playground, dog park, three-acre lake, and a 1.5-mile paved trail through the lowlands adjacent to Cedar Creek.



Rabbit Hill Park near Dacula will add two soccer fields, a concession/restroom building, and a trail extension. The park will also have seven new baseball/softball fields, a multi-purpose field with a lighted walking track, playgrounds, and a six-acre lake that will provide irrigation water from an on-site well. The nearly \$9.6 million project also includes road improvements with a traffic signal and turn lanes at the intersection of Hurricane Shoals Road and Rabbit Hill Road.

These facilities were part of the 2009 SPLOST sales tax program and will be under construction soon. Volunteers including the Mountain View Youth Athletic Association will assist the County in maintaining the park. Register for your Peach Pass

Don't forget to get your Peach Pass to ride in the I-85 Express Lanes this fall. Transit buses, motorcycles, alternative-fueled vehicles, and vehicles with three or more passengers will be allowed to use the I-85 Express Lanes for free, while single- and double-occupant vehicles will be allowed to use the lane if they choose to pay a variably priced toll.

All vehicles must pre-register to ride in the I-85 Express Lanes through the Peach Pass program. Toll rates will vary based on the number of vehicles using the lane.
