Solid Waste earns international award

The Solid Waste Association of North America (SWANA) awarded Gwinnett County's Solid Waste and Recovered Materials Division the **Silver Excellence Award in Communication**. The award recognizes excellence in the creation and use of communications tools to inform audiences about new or existing solid waste management programs, projects, or organizations.

The Solid Waste and Recovered Materials Division earned the award for the success of its communication plan. The award highlighted the successful implementation of the County's new solid waste and recycling program and the use of a variety of communications tools to educate residents who were affected by the program. Solid Waste and Recovered Materials Director **Tom Keith** said, "We are honored to receive this award from SWANA and hope that our experiences will be helpful to others as they deal with the implementation of complex community-wide programs."

Stream restoration project improves water quality

North Fork Peachtree Creek is a dynamic little creek that winds its way through western Gwinnett County and joins Peachtree Creek in Fulton County before flowing into the Chattahoochee River. A tributary to the creek located off South Norcross-Tucker Road had been identified by Water Resources as being severely degraded with severe bank erosion, lack of flood control, and a high percentage of impervious surfaces in the drainage basin, contributing to nonpoint source pollution in the creek.

The department restored the 1,200-foot stream and created a stormwater treatment area. The restoration project raised the creek bed back to natural elevations and incorporated in-stream structures to stabilize the stream banks. The stormwater treatment area consists of a wetland that was constructed through reclamation of an abandoned oxidation pond. The wetland captures stormwater runoff, while native plant species filter the polluted water before it flows into the nearby streams. The new habitat created by the restoration encourages the growth of beneficial aquatic organisms and helps control pests that thrived in the degraded stream.

This project, funded through a U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Section 319 grant, was completed in 2011. It received awards from the Georgia Association of Water Professionals and the Georgia section of the American Water Works Association. Safety tips for drivers and pedestrians

Another school year is here, which means more people are walking in our neighborhoods and around schools. It is everyone's responsibility to know the laws pertaining to pedestrian safety.

Drivers:

- Always yield to pedestrians in a crosswalk
- Be careful at intersections when making right turns on red; 90 percent of pedestrians die if hit by a car traveling 40 mph, compared to 5 percent at 20 mph
- Use caution when driving where people gather

Pedestrians:

- Be sure to cross the street at crosswalks
- If there are no pedestrian signals, cross with the green light
- When crossing with pedestrian signals, start crossing with the WALK light after looking both ways – the driver may also have a green light
- If there is no sidewalk, walk along the shoulder facing traffic



SPLOST

Commissioners approve road safety improvements

Gwinnett commissioners approved construction contracts for two SPLOST- and grant-funded transportation upgrades in June.



Upgrades to Jimmy Carter Boulevard at Singleton Road will give a boost to pedestrian safety. The project will add turn lanes on three legs of the intersection along with improvements to sidewalks, curb and gutter, and retaining walls. CMES Inc. was the lowest of four bidders at \$918,964.10. Less than eight percent of the cost comes from local SPLOST funds, while the Georgia Department of Transportation will pay 43 percent and the State Road and Tollway Authority almost 49 percent.

Beware of utility bill scams

There is currently a scam circulating throughout the nation claiming that the president or federal government will provide credits or apply payments to utility bills. Residents may be contacted by email, U.S. mail, social media, text, or direct phone calls. The scammers request Social Security

numbers and other personal information and then give victims fraudulent banking information to use to pay their utility bills.

The Department of Water Resources offers the following tips to prevent becoming a victim:

- Do not provide your personal or financial information to anyone you do not know
- If you suspect you have been contacted by a scammer, contact your local police
- Do not attempt to make payments for utility bills using financial information from someone else

Helpful gardening tips from Gwinnett Cooperative Extension

During prolonged dry periods, raise the lawn mower blade one-half inch. The longer leaf blades will shade the soil, keeping the grass roots cooler and reducing moisture loss. When adjusting the mowing height, measure the distance of the mowing blades to the ground and make sure all four wheels are set at the same height.
