Recycling the right way

Gwinnett County's solid waste plan makes it easy for residents to recycle curbside, and with more recyclables collected than ever before, residents can significantly reduce the amount of waste that goes into landfills.


Before you place recycling in your bins, be sure to clean out your cans, bottles, and containers, and clean off your paper plates. Don't put recyclables in a plastic bag, since they are not recyclable at the curb. Other items such as paper towels, light bulbs, and batteries aren't recyclable at the curb either. Remember that you can use additional bins for recycling, including an old trash cart, as long as they are clearly marked "recyclables."

Septic systems impact Gwinnett's streams

There are more than 200 miles of streams in Gwinnett County that are impaired due to fecal coliform bacteria. This type of bacteria will not necessarily make you sick, but it is an indicator of the possible presence of other disease-causing bacteria. There are multiple sources of fecal coliform bacteria, including pet waste, sewer overflows, septic systems, and wildlife. Gwinnett County has some areas with a high density of septic systems, and many of these septic systems are getting old. Having your septic system serviced every three to five years is the best way to prevent your system from failing. Preventing a failure can help save you money and also protect Gwinnett streams.

Winter weather safety

With the temperatures getting colder and the potential for icy conditions on the rise, Gwinnett Fire and Emergency Services encourages residents to stay safe and enjoy the winter weather season by following a few simple rules:

- Avoid playing, skating, or driving over any frozen body of water. Remember that only the surface area is frozen and the ice will not be thick enough to hold the weight of an adult, child, or a large animal
- Dress warmly in layers and limit your time out in the cold weather to avoid hypothermia or frostbite
- If you must drive, monitor weather and road conditions and stay alert while driving
- Use home heating appliances with caution and don't leave them on when you go to bed or leave the house
- Install and maintain smoke and carbon monoxide alarms in the home. Develop and practice a home escape plan

SPLOST

Five Forks Library undergoes renovation

Upgrades planned for the 16-year-old Five Forks Branch Library in Lawrenceville will help control operating costs and improve efficiency. Commissioners approved the construction contract in December 2011.

Needed improvements identified in 2007 include lighting, mechanical equipment, temperature control, sight lines, moisture/ water infiltration, air quality, and lowering overall energy use. The \$1.06 million project also includes new carpet, paint, and finishes throughout the 20,135 square-foot building. Classic



Plains Construction, LLC, was the lowest of eight bids received for the work, which includes disposal of old building materials, fixtures, and shelving. Project funding comes from the voterapproved SPLOST sales tax program.

Contractors will complete the efficiency upgrade in two phases over seven months beginning in early winter. They will close the building to the public during the first phase of construction that includes the front of the building, the meeting room, and lobby restrooms. Library staff will still provide curbside checkout of reserved items. During phase two, many library services will be available in the new front section and in temporary trailers provided by the Gwinnett school system.

AROUND GWINNETT

Plumbing rebates continue in 2012

Gwinnett County will continue its successful toilet rebate program and open it up to include multi-family units in 2012. The program provides rebates of up to \$100 to homeowners, and they may replace up to two original toilets in homes built prior to a 1993 building code change. Newer toilets use up to 20 percent less water than the current federal standard, while still providing equal or superior performance.

Police conduct gang sweep

The Gwinnett County Police Department announced the results of a gang investigation during a joint press conference with the ATF on December 19. The nine-month long investigation focused on a criminal street gang operating under a larger gang called "Gangster Disciples." Members of this gang are responsible for committing drug transactions, burglaries, thefts, robberies, carjackings, and other violent crimes.

Officers and agents made 31 arrests during a gang sweep held on December 14. In total, the investigation resulted in the arrest of 49 gang members, 248 felony warrants, 96 felony indictments, and 17 misdemeanor warrants.
