If you're wondering if any of your pool essentials can be recycled, check the bottom of the item! If it's plastic, look for a number inside a recycle symbol. If it's a number one through seven, it can be recycled. And please remember that Independence Day is not a trash and recycling holiday, so pickup service will take place as usual. Tap water is smarter

Gwinnett County's Lake Lanier is an exceptionally high-quality raw water source that meets or exceeds all standards for drinking water. At our two state-of-the-art water filtration plants, the Department of Water Resources continuously monitors water quality parameters to ensure the delivery of affordable, high-quality tap water to our customers.

Despite having excellent water available at the tap, the average American drinks around 30 gallons of bottled water each year, most of it from single-serve plastic containers. Bottled water is not safer, healthier, or more strictly regulated than tap water, and in many cases it comes from a source that is less pure than the local water supply. Not only does bottled water contribute to excessive waste, but it costs more than 1,000 times the water from your faucet at home. It is estimated that 17 million barrels of oil are used each year to make plastic water bottles. That's enough oil to fuel 1 million cars for 12 months!

People in the U.S. drink and discard more than half a billion bottles of water each week. That's enough bottles to circle the Earth five times! On average, only 25 percent of those plastic bottles are actually recycled and the other 75 percent (1 million tons) end up in landfills, as roadside litter, or in our waterways. Choosing tap water over bottled water helps protect the environment, conserves natural resources, and saves you money. We encourage you to grab a reusable bottle and fill up at the tap instead!

Why a burn ban?

During the summer months in Georgia, the ozone in the air we breathe can reach unhealthy levels. Consequently, open burning in metro Atlanta and larger counties is restricted during the warm weather season. In Gwinnett County, the burn ban takes place from May 1 to September 30.

During the burn ban, you may not burn trees, limbs, or any other yard waste. Specific types of burning is allowed, but only if you get a permit from the Gwinnett County Fire Marshal.

If you live in incorporated Gwinnett County and need to get rid of yard waste, contact your solid waste hauler to add yard waste pickup service. To locate your hauler, visit www.sustainablegwinnett.com.

ELECTIONS

Register to vote in the July 31 election

The 2012 General Primary/Nonpartisan election will take place on Tuesday, July 31. The deadline to register to vote and be eligible to cast a ballot in the election is Monday, July 2.

To register to vote in Georgia, you must be a citizen of the United States, a legal resident of Georgia and of the county in which you wish to vote, and at least 18 years old by Election Day. You may not register to vote if you are currently serving any sentence imposed by the conviction of a felony or judicially determined to be mentally incompetent.

Registered voters may request an absentee ballot by mail or cast their ballots in person from July 9 to July 27, Monday through Friday from 8:00am to 5:00pm at the Gwinnett County Elections Office, located at 455 Grayson Highway in Lawrenceville. Saturday voting will also be available at the elections office on July 21.

In addition, satellite offices will be open July 23 – 27 from 9:00am to 7:00pm at the Centerville Community Center in Snellville, George Pierce Park Community Recreation Center in Suwanee, Dacula Park Activity Building in Dacula, and Lucky Shoals Park Community Recreation Center in Norcross. Two county buildings receive LEED® Gold certification

The Gwinnett Senior Services Center and the new Operations Center at the Yellow River Water Reclamation Facility have been LEED Gold certified. LEED® is the nation's preeminent program for the design, construction, and operation of high-performance green buildings.

The Senior Services Center, at 567 Swanson Drive in Lawrenceville, is a one-stop center where seniors' needs are matched with available resources such as information and assistance, counseling, and care management.

The Yellow River Water Reclamation Center was constructed using recycled concrete, metal, wood, and gypsum. In addition to its everyday function as the facility's operational hub, the center will be used as a teaching tool on water efficiency and treatment, as well as other environmental issues.

Protect yourself and your home from mosquitoes

To reduce the mosquito population around your home, eliminate their breeding areas by cleaning gutters, replacing the water in birdbaths, draining flowerpot saucers, and removing any other sources of standing water.

New! Flat fee for online motor vehicle transactions
