New wireless alerts keep residents and visitors safe in an emergency

The Gwinnett County Office of Emergency Management has tapped into an existing feature on wireless telephones that alerts users when an imminent threat to safety occurs in their area. The new wireless emergency alerts will be sent by the County to all wireless phones that are located in close proximity to an emergency in Gwinnett. Alerts will include the time and type of alert and any action residents and visitors in the affected area should take. The messages will not duplicate AMBER alerts or extreme weather messages from the National Weather Service.

"These alerts will be sent to any enabled mobile device in range of the broadcasting cell tower, so it helps us reach those who need to avoid or evacuate a specific area in the county or to shelter-in-place to maintain their safety," said Emergency Management Director **Greg Swanson**. The alerts will be sent when emergency events—such as an earthquake, immediate evacuation, fire, or hazardous materials leak or spill—pose a threat to life.

To insure that you receive these lifesaving alerts, make sure the emergency alerts feature is enabled and activated on your mobile device. Community emergency volunteer courses available this fall

The Gwinnett County Office of Emergency Management is offering free Community Emergency Response Team, or CERT, training to Gwinnett County residents beginning September 8. CERT courses educate residents about disaster preparedness for emergencies that may impact their community. Residents are trained in basic disaster response skills such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations.

CERT training is open to all Gwinnett County residents 18 years and older who pass a background check provided by the Gwinnett County Police Department. The training consists of eight sessions that take place from 6:30pm to 9:00pm on Tuesdays. A course review and disaster simulation will take place on Saturday, October 24 from 8:00am to noon. South Gwinnett Park renovation begins soon

The Board of Commissioners recently approved an \$8.4 million contract with Multiplex LLC to begin redevelopment of the 23-acre South Gwinnett Park located in the Snellville area.

Originally purchased by Gwinnett County in 2006, the redeveloped park will feature six reconstructed baseball/ softball fields; a new artificial-turf field for football, soccer, and lacrosse; concession/restroom buildings; a playground; picnic tables; benches; new parking lots; and a redesigned entrance on McGee Road. Existing facilities will be demolished except for the indoor hockey building, which will remain in operation throughout construction.

The multi-purpose field will have bleachers and a press box and the baseball complex includes batting cages, dugouts, fencing, irrigation, and shade structures.

Tips to keep your kids safe at the bus stop

It's the beginning of another school year, which means many students will board the school bus to get to school. Safe Kids Gwinnett wants to help your kids get a gold star in bus safety with these tips.

- Walk with your kids to the bus stop and wait with them until the bus arrives.
- Tell kids to stand three giant steps back from the curb as the bus approaches and board the bus one at a time.
- Teach kids to wait for the bus to come to a complete stop before getting off and never to walk behind the bus.
- If your child needs to cross the street after exiting the bus, he or she should take five giant steps in front of the bus, make eye contact with the bus driver, and cross when the driver indicates it's safe.
- Teach kids to look left, right, and left again before crossing the street.
- Drivers, slow down in school zones, near bus stops, and near a school bus with flashing yellow or red lights.

Adopt-a-Stream to keep waterways clean

Gwinnett is home to thousands of waterbodies that play an integral role in maintaining the quality of life we all enjoy. The aquatic ecosystems that exist within our streams are delicate and highly sensitive to environmental changes such as nonpoint source pollution, which washes into storm drains with runoff during rain events.

In an effort to protect our water quality, the Georgia Environmental Protection Division's Adopt-A-Stream volunteer program empowers residents with the tools they need to monitor the condition of local streams. The program also provides information to the public about nonpoint source pollution, stream monitoring, and water quality protection.

Gwinnett Clean & Beautiful, in partnership with the Department of Water Resources, administers the county's Adopt-A-Stream program. Teachers, students, and the general public receive training on water quality monitoring protocols, which helps promote the protection of our fragile aquatic ecosystems. In addition, volunteers can serve as "keepers" of a portion of a creek or stream by monitoring its condition with supplies, training, and certifications in chemical, bacterial, and macroinvertebrate testing provided by Gwinnett Clean & Beautiful and the Department of Water Resources.
