### County officials launch initiative to reduce litter in Gwinnett

The Gwinnett County Board of Commissioners, in partnership with Gwinnett Clean & Beautiful, recently launched an initiative to develop and foster a sense of ownership and stewardship of public lands. The **ME (My Environment) Campaign** encourages Gwinnett residents and commuters to do their part to prevent litter along rights of way, medians, and streams that tend to be littered and used as dumping grounds.

The campaign kicked off in September at the intersection of Beaver Ruin Road and Steve Reynolds Boulevard, which is one of three sites in the Beaver Ruin watershed where officials have noticed an increase in litter along roadsides over the past year. The litter eventually makes its way into storm-water drains and nearby waterways and negatively impacts the county's social, economic, and environmental health.

## New classroom coming to Environmental and Heritage Center

The Gwinnett Environmental and Heritage Center will convert existing storage space to build a new classroom and educator workroom. The Board of Commissioners approved a \$409,506 contract in September with low bidder, Bayne Development Group LLC. The 2014 SPLOST program is funding the work.

Educational programming doubled during the last year, causing the center to reach capacity. The EHC offers classes and special events for K-12 students, homeschoolers, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and seniors, plus it holds exhibits, symposiums, and community events for the general public.

Existing storage and open space will be converted into classrooms and teacher workroom space. Construction will begin in October and finish by the end of the year.

### Help kids have a fun, safe Halloween

No Halloween celebration is complete without a great costume. Costumes can be both creative and safe, so here are some tips to ensure your children are ready for a fun, safe Halloween:

- Make sure your kids' costumes are visible to motorists by choose costumes that are light or bright-colored, or use glow sticks or reflective tape.
- Children should wear well-fitting, sturdy shoes.
- Secure hats and scarves to prevent them from slipping over children's eyes.
- Avoid loose-fitting masks that may restrict breathing or obscure vision.
- Swords, knives, and similar accessories should be made of soft, flexible material.

Drivers, slow down in neighborhoods and be on alert for children, especially during peak trick-or-treating hours.

## PROTECTING OUR RESOURCES

### Don't flush "flushable" wipes

Sewer backups can happen all over the county in both residential and commercial buildings, but there are many ways to prevent them. You've heard of fats, oils, and grease, or FOG, which is the primary culprit of sewer backups. It's easy to fight FOG—simply reduce the amount that goes down the drain by wiping dishes with a paper towel and pouring liquid grease and oils into containers that you throw away in the trash. Be aware though, there's another cause to sewer backups that you may think is safe for sewer systems.

Materials such as standard toilet paper will easily break down, but many items made from cotton, polyester, plastics, or latex that may be labeled as "flushable" take much longer to degrade. While these items may go down the drain, they will stay inside pipes and settle in sewer or lateral lines that connect your home to the sewer. These materials also give fats, oils, and grease something to hold onto while passing through the sewer system. Rags, cloths, and wipes—including toilet wipes—can also clog sewer pumps and cause them to fail.

Gwinnett County has more than 200 sewer pumps that could cause major sewer overflows if they stop working. Backups and overflows are expensive, messy, and can have a negative effect on the environment. Outdoor backups will often overflow into local waterways, causing unsanitary water and unsafe conditions for residents and wildlife. As the holidays are approaching, be sure to only flush standard toilet paper and keep FOG out of the drain. By doing your part, you can be thankful for a backup free holiday season!
