Commissioners call for SPLOST vote on November ballot

Gwinnett commissioners on Tuesday, July 19 officially called for a referendum to be placed on the November 8 general election ballot for the renewal of the one-cent special purpose local option sales tax, or SPLOST. The current SPLOST program ends next March.

The County and all 16 Gwinnett cities have again agreed to share the proceeds, as they have since 2001. The new program could raise an estimated \$950 million over six years to be used for transportation improvements along with public safety, parks and recreation, library relocations and renovations, civic center expansion, senior service facilities, and city administrative, parking, and cultural facilities plus city water and sewer capital improvements.

Gwinnett County will receive 78.76 percent of the proceeds and the cities will receive 21.24 percent. The County has determined that 65 percent of its share, or an estimated \$486 million, will be dedicated to transportation projects such as roads, streets, bridges, and sidewalks, including \$30.8 million for joint city/county transportation projects. The County has also agreed to set aside approximately \$3.2 million for joint parks and recreation improvements. Additional information about SPLOST can be found online at www.gwinnettSPLOST.com.

Ronald Reagan Park gets a facelift

The 11-year-old park named after the 40th president has gotten a facelift. The \$1,116,000 renovation was completed at Ronald Reagan Park through a grant from the Land and Water Conservation Fund and funding from the 2014 SPLOST. Renovations included removal and reconstruction of the skate park, reconstruction of footbridges and railings, construction of a gabion wall at stream, dog park reconfiguration, storm drainage improvements, sidewalk connections, erosion control, landscaping and reforestation.

Ronald Reagan Park's colorful playground is the perfect way for kids to enjoy the outdoors. Other amenities in this 25-acre park include a dog park, horseshoe pits, shuffleboard courts, bocce ball courts, two half-basketball courts, pavilions, and a multi-purpose trail. Ronald Reagan Park is located at 2777 Five Forks Trickum Road in Lawrenceville and is open from sunrise to sunset. 

Tips to prevent heat stroke for young athletes

Kids are back in school, which means many young athletes will head to sports fields for practices and games. With scorching high temperatures this summer, the dangers of heat stroke are apparent. Heat stroke can be deadly, so parents and coaches have an important role to play to keep kids safe. The easiest way to reduce the chance of heat stroke is to keep your child hydrated during physical activity. Here are some tips to follow:

- Give water to your young athlete at least 30 minutes prior to physical activity
- Make sure your child takes regular water breaks every 15 to 20 minutes
- The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that kids up to 88 pounds drink five ounces of water; kids up to 132 pounds should drink nine ounces.

Why pick up pet waste?

Pet waste is an obvious problem when you step in it, but what about when rain hits it? Doesn't it just absorb into the ground?

Pet waste is a contributor to the main type of water pollution found in Gwinnett County – fecal coliform bacteria. It is in a category of bacteria that originate in the gut flora of warm-blooded animals and is used as an indicator of fecal contamination in waterways. People who swim, fish, or boat in these waterways can be exposed to diseases that pet waste can cause. As pet waste decomposes in water, it can deplete the oxygen level or increase the ammonia level of the water and cause harm to fish and other water life.

When pet waste is left on the ground, runoff from the next rain event will carry small particles of waste and bacteria to the nearest storm drain or waterway where the bacteria can proliferate and the nutrients can cause excessive algae growth. This happens at home, in your neighbor's yard, at the park, or any location where pet waste is left on the ground.

We know what you're thinking: all animals and wildlife leave their waste on the ground—what's the problem? One could argue that animal waste is all the same. However, pet waste in the environment compounds the problems caused by natural sources. So, remember to take a bag and pick up after your dog when you take him outside. Your actions will help to keep potentially harmful bacteria out of Gwinnett's waterways, create a safer environment, and maintain good neighborly relations.
