#### Tax Assessors Office issues real estate property annual assessment notices

Most residential and commercial annual notice of assessments were mailed April 8. An annual notice of assessment is not a tax bill. The notice informs you of the value assessed on your residential or commercial real estate as of January I, 2016. If you do not agree with the notice value, you may appeal during the 45-day appeal period, which begins from the date on your notice and ends 45 days later (May 23 for those dated April 8). Visit **www.gwinnett-assessor.com** to appeal your 2016 value electronically or submit a completed PT311A state appeal form to the Tax Assessors Office before the end of the 45-day appeal period.

# Commissioners approve construction for new Centerville senior center

A new Centerville Senior Center will soon be under construction adjacent to the Centerville Community Center and the Centerville Branch Library on Bethany Church Road near Snellville. County commissioners awarded the \$2.24 million contract to low bidder Hogan Construction Group LLC in April. Funding comes from the 2014 SPLOST program.

The 8,500-square-foot single-story facility will include a dining room, warming kitchen with serving line, multipurpose room, billiards area, staff offices, and support space. It will serve as a nutrition site offering healthy meals that meet one-third of the daily recommended intake. Programming will promote healthy lifestyles and celebrate the diversity of Gwinnett residents 60 and older with activities that promote socialization and health and wellness.

### **PUBLIC SAFETY**

#### Be prepared for severe weather this spring

Severe storms have the potential to destroy property and cause fatalities, making it important for Gwinnett County residents to be prepared. Check out these tips for staying safe during a severe storm:

- Check if your insurance covers flood damage. If not, get flood insurance. Keep those insurance documents along with valuable items in a safe deposit box.
- If you encounter flooded roads, turn around. Don't drown!
- Assemble a disaster supplies kit and ensure it includes prescription medications, food, and water.
- Be sure to monitor local media outlets for weatherrelated information and learn about the terms used to describe severe storms.
- Make a keep-in-touch arrangement with relatives and friends.

# **PROTECTING OUR RESOURCES**

#### Save water outdoors this summer

During peak summer months, many homeowners use more water for lawns, gardens, and landscapes. By watering wisely and using simple conservation tips, consumers can see better results all while saving money and water.

Water the grass, not the street: Check to make sure that sprinklers are only watering where they need to water. Often, systems will water driveways and sidewalks instead of yards. Redirect and position your sprinklers to ensure water is being applied to the lawn only. Also remember to have your system checked annually for any leaks or broken sprinkler heads.

**Timing is important:** Set your irrigation system or hose timer to water at the right time. The ideal time for maximum irrigation benefit is between the hours of 4:00pm and 10:00am. By watering during this time, you can reduce the amount of water that is lost to evaporation or wind and you will be in compliance with the *Georgia Water Stewardship Act*.

**Seal the hose:** Adding a shut-off nozzle to your garden hose not only saves 5 to 7 gallons per minute while the hose is in use, it can prolong the life of plants by watering with the proper flow setting.

**Use rain:** Established lawns need only one inch of water per week to stay healthy. When there is enough rain to soak the soil, turn off your irrigation system and skip a watering cycle to avoid overwatering.
