Transit offers more options to downtown commuters

Gwinnett County Transit added new bus afternoon pick-up times for commuters returning from downtown Atlanta to Gwinnett Park and Ride lots. The new service now runs two buses before peak afternoon times at 1:45pm and 2:45pm, and three buses after peak afternoon times at 6:45pm, 7:15pm, and 7:45pm. Fire and Emergency Services improves ISO rating

Gwinnett County property owners could see their insurance rates drop after an independent review of the Department of Fire and Emergency Services and County infrastructure. The Insurance Services Office, a private organization used by some insurance companies in setting rates, reviewed the department's operations and equipment along with the County's water supply and E-911. Fire Chief Casey Snyder attributed the improved score to enhancements in training, prevention efforts, new stations, and more fire apparatus that help the department better serve the community.

Centerville Senior Center opens with fanfare

Gwinnett County Health and Human Services officially unveiled the highly anticipated Centerville Senior Center, located at 3075 Bethany Church Road, with a ribbon cutting ceremony in August.

The newly built 8,456-square-foot center offers a variety of features designed to meet the needs of Gwinnett County's aging adults, such as a dining room capable of serving more than 100 seniors, a full kitchen with a serving line, a multi-purpose room, billiards area, personal care room, support space, and staff offices. The building operates efficiently and sustainably and also offers functionality to those with visual, hearing, and mobility challenges.

Funds for the \$2.9-million building were provided by the voter-approved 2014 Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax (SPLOST) program – the first to allocate funds specifically for senior services capital projects.

Share the road with school buses

Did you know that it is against the law to pass stopped school buses from either direction unless there's a grass or concrete median between you and the bus?

Gwinnett County Public Schools has installed cameras on 300 of its buses as a deterrent for drivers who illegally pass school buses picking up or dropping off children. When the bus lights are flashing, the system automatically takes pictures of vehicles passing the stopped school bus.

Detention or retention, which is your pond?

When it rains, runoff could go into a retention pond or a detention pond. They sound similar and both need regular maintenance to function properly, but there are subtle differences between the two.

Retention ponds are typically older structures intended to capture stormwater runoff and hold it indefinitely. The water evaporates, soaks into the ground, or is pushed out by the next rain event. Detention ponds also capture stormwater runoff, but are designed to slowly release that water over the course of a set amount of time. This process of capturing and holding rainwater is how a detention or retention pond helps protect the environment by slowing down stormwater and preventing flooding.

Fortunately, you don't have to determine if your pond is detention or retention in order to make sure it is functioning properly. All stormwater ponds should:

- be free of trash and large debris that can block the outlet control structure
- have small, soft-bodied plants and grasses established to prevent erosion
- have erosion stabilized quickly
- have trees and other woody shrubs cut and removed

Each of these tasks can be handled by the pond owner or neighbors from a subdivision if they are addressed early and regularly. Ponds that have not been maintained for some time may require the expertise and equipment of a pond maintenance contractor.

Whether retention or detention, if you keep your stormwater pond maintained, you can reduce the cost of ongoing maintenance, prolong the life of the pond, and protect the environment downstream.
