County updates parks study to shape recreation

Starting this fall, Gwinnett County is taking a fresh look at its park and recreation system with a 2020 Comprehensive Parks and Recreation Master Plan.

With a 10-year master plan—the first A to Z review of the system since 2004—the County will update the Parks and Recreation capital improvement plan and its maintenance and asset management plan. The plan will also include a blueprint for recreational programs and for natural and cultural resources for the first time. The idea is to learn what programs the public wants, what kind of facilities the County should build, and where they should go.

Beginning in October, parks staff and the consultant Perez Planning + Design will launch significant outreach efforts to solicit public input, including open house sessions, focus group sessions, intercept interviews, and surveys at events and online.

The \$411,500 master plan contract will be funded by the 2017 SPLOST program. The master plan is expected to be ready to present to the Board of Commissioners in late summer 2020.

Your personal census data will be kept private

The U.S. Census Bureau is legally prohibited from sharing personal information with any organization, agency (including law enforcement), or person, so residents can answer census questions without fear of having their personal answers being used without their permission.

The Census Bureau is also forbidden from releasing or publishing any identifiable information about you, your household, or your business. Your answers are only used for statistical purposes.

Celebrate National Hispanic Heritage Month

Gwinnett County will celebrate contributions by the Hispanic community during Hispanic Heritage Month, which runs **September 15 to October 15**. The festivities will include a special recognition and reception at the Gwinnett Justice and Administration Center with guest speakers, entertainment, and cultural cuisine. A Latino and Hispanic cultural exhibit will be on display at GJAC. Did you know that Hispanic refers to descendants of people from countries where Spanish is the primary language? Latino refers to people from Latin America. They often overlap but not always. People from Brazil, where Portuguese is the primary language, are Latino but not Hispanic, and people from Spain are Hispanic but not Latino.

Trails program gaining steam

A year after the Board of Commissioners approved the Countywide Trails Master Plan, about 10 trails are being designed and two are under construction. When the multi-year plan is finally completed, Gwinnett will have grown from about 130 miles of trails to about 350 and connect cities, schools, parks, retail areas, and other activity centers for pedestrians, joggers, hikers, and other users.

The Camp Creek Greenway in Lilburn and the Sugar Hill Greenway in Sugar Hill are complete, while the Western Gwinnett Bikeway from Duluth to Suwanee is underway. Trails in Norcross, Duluth, Suwanee, Peachtree Corners, and Centerville are being designed. The trail system is funded through several SPLOST programs and represents a partnership with multiple County departments, cities, community improvement districts, the state, and the federal government.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Keep kids safe this Halloween

Children are twice as likely to be killed walking on Halloween than any other day of the year. Parents should prepare kids to be safe while trick-or-treating, and drivers need to be particularly alert during the evening hours of Halloween.

Police officers encourage motorists to slow down and watch for children in the roadway. Children should be careful not to dart out from houses or between cars, and children younger than age 12 should not cross streets without an adult. Youngsters should stay in groups, carry flashlights, visit familiar houses, and avoid dark or unlit areas. Children should avoid authentic-looking guns and swords, and they should never accept rides or candy from strangers. Older kids trick-or-treating without adult supervision should travel in a group and stick to a predetermined route with good lighting.

Firefighters suggest using flameless candles for jack-o'-lanterns and choosing decorations and costumes made of flame-retardant materials. Costumes should fit properly; billowing capes and baggy sleeves pose a tripping hazard as well as a fire hazard. Adopt a stream to clean and protect

The Gwinnett Adopt-a-Stream program gives volunteers the opportunity to be stewards of our watersheds and help protect our rivers and streams, many of which help provide habitat for local wildlife. Fortunately, there are ways that you can get involved to help ensure that our streams meet established water quality standards.

The program, a partnership between Gwinnett Clean & Beautiful and the Department of Water Resources, provides the training and tools to monitor chemical, bacterial, or macroinvertebrate activity in local waterways to ensure they remain healthy. Gwinnett Clean & Beautiful offers certification courses throughout the year at various locations around the county. These free courses are the first step toward adopting a waterway and protecting the environment in your community.

The Gwinnett Adopt-a-Stream program also provides free assistance for stream cleanups by providing bags, gloves, and safety vests. Litter can have a huge impact on the health of nearby streams and creeks and it is important to keep the areas surrounding these waterways as clean as possible. Through this program you encourage your friends and family to get involved. In addition, this is a great opportunity for students to earn volunteer hours.

It's quick and easy to join the program and adopt a waterway near you:

1. Select a waterway that offers easy access
2. Scout your waterway
3. If needed, schedule a cleanup to get rid of litter
4. Attend training workshops on monitoring water quality if you choose
5. Take action!
