Commissioners continue to meet remotely

Despite the challenges associated with COVID-19, the Gwinnett County Board of Commissioners is continuing to conduct its business remotely. Commissioners have held regular work and business sessions to approve projects, sign off on contracts, and set policy, while complying with social distancing recommendations.

For work sessions and business sessions, some commissioners are at the Gwinnett Justice and Administration Center while others connect by computer or by smartphone. The board canceled evening public hearings to limit in-person gatherings.

On March 17, the board approved a \$17 million resurfacing contract and accepted \$7 million in state grant funds for resurfacing. The board also approved contracts to build the Lloyd Harris Trail at Harbins Park and the Water Tower Global Innovation Hub at Gwinnett. On April 7, they approved a transit plan to be submitted to The Atlanta-Regional Transit Link Authority. Then on April 14, the board met virtually to discuss upcoming budget priorities.

Primary elections set for June 9

The Georgia Secretary of State has moved the Presidential Preference Primary and the state and local primary from May 19 to June 9. Votes already cast in the Presidential Preference Primary will be counted whether in person or by mail. May 11 is the deadline to register to vote in the primaries. Advance in-person voting begins May 18 at the Gwinnett Voter Registrations and Elections Beauty P. Baldwin Building on Grayson Highway. Repair leaks and fix a hole in your budget

Leaks account for more than 10,000 gallons of water waste in an average home every year - about the same amount of water used by a family of four in a month.

Even minor leaks can add up to major water loss and a higher water bill. You can compare your water usage using the histogram on the new version of the bill for indications of a leak. To check for leaks at home, look for dripping faucets and showerheads, inspect the pipes under sinks, in the basement, and around the water heater, or look for soggy areas in the yard.

A running toilet could be silently wasting up to 200 gallons of water or more daily. To find toilet leaks, put a dye tab or a couple of drops of food coloring in the tank. If the dye spreads into the unflushed bowl after 15 minutes, you likely have a leak, possibly from a deteriorating rubber toilet flapper, an easily fixable project that quickly pays for itself.

Department of Water Resources encourages you to conduct these simple tests for leaks. Maintenance and repair of pipes and fixtures can save money and conserves our valuable resources.

Don't fall for work-at-home scams

Scammers are trying to take advantage of the pandemic in a variety of ways. Their targets include people hit hard financially.

You may see ads offering a variety of work-at-home jobs, such as internet businesses, shipping and mailing work, or selling goods, but many are ruses to steal your money.

The Federal Trade Commission has some useful tips to avoiding becoming a victim.

- Don't pay to get a job. Scammers promise a job after you pay for training, equipment, supplies, or a certification, but the job never materializes
- Be skeptical of job ads. Research a potential employer by searching online for their name, email address, and phone number to find complaints or criminal history
- Don't believe ads for "previously undisclosed" federal government jobs. Information about federal jobs is free at usajobs.gov





SPLOST

County buys four new fire engines

Gwinnett County commissioners recently approved about \$2.6 million in 2017 SPLOST program funds to buy four new fire engines over two years. The engines, known as triple combination rescue-style pumpers, will cost \$642,147 each.

With a staff of 1,008 employees, Gwinnett Fire and Emergency Services responds to more than 84,000 calls annually with 31 engine companies, 12 ladder trucks, and 31 ambulances. EMTs and paramedics staff all emergency response vehicles and carry essential medical equipment for advanced life support.
