County launches major infrastructure project in eastern Gwinnett

Gwinnett has started construction on an infrastructure project that will provide water, sewer, and trails for 8,500 acres of land in eastern Gwinnett.

The Eastern Regional Infrastructure Project includes approximately five miles of new public trails, two trailheads, upgraded and expanded water service, and expanded sewer service. The \$125 million project will be funded by the departments of Water Resources and Community Services, including revenue from the 2017 SPLOST program, which will fund the trails component of the project.

The trail system will provide access to trails heading to Barrow County and beyond to the east. With its planned connectivity to the future Piedmont Pathway to the southwest, users will be able to access trail systems across the metro Atlanta region, some of which extend all the way into Alabama.

Protect storm drains from illicit discharges

Storm drains are an integral part of the public infrastructure and help keep rainwater off our streets and parking lots. In Gwinnett, storm drains are separate from the sewer system, which means that anything discharged into a storm drain will flow directly into a local waterway.

Anything other than rainwater is considered an illicit discharge and can pollute our waterways. Illicit discharges also violate a County ordinance prohibiting the discharge of anything other than rainwater to the stormwater drainage system. Common illicit discharges include:

- Soapy water
- Used or leaking motor oil
- Paint
- Pet waste
- Leaves and grass clippings

You can report if someone is discharging waste products into a storm drain by calling at 678.376.7000. Water Resources will investigate the situation and if necessary, issue enforcement to stop it. For more information, visit Gwinnett2o.com.

New tag office hours

PUBLIC SAFETY

Be prepared in case winter weather traps you in your car

With the peak of winter storm season upon us, it's a good time to prepare for weather conditions like snow and ice that could trap you in your car.

Take these few steps to prepare for a winter emergency in your vehicle:

- Before you leave, check weather forecasts on your route
- Dress for the weather outside, not for the inside of your vehicle, with several layers of loose-fitting clothing covered by a topcoat
- Try not to travel alone, but if you must, let someone know your timetable and routes
- Winterize your vehicle and keep your gas tank at least half full to prevent your fuel line from freezing
- Stock an emergency kit with food and bottled water, a portable cell phone charger, ice scraper, flashlight and batteries, a first aid kit, blankets, jumper cables, and sand or cat litter for traction
- If you do get stuck on the road, remain in your vehicle where rescuers are most likely to find you



SPLOST

Pedestrian projects currently in progress on State Route 120 and State Route 20

Pedestrian improvement projects recently began on two of Gwinnett's major routes, State Route 120 and State Route 20.

The \$312,700 project will construct new sidewalks along the north side of State Route 120/Duluth Highway from Colony Bend Drive to Riverside Parkway and on the east side of State Route 20/Grayson Highway from Crane Drive to Park Place Drive.

New curb and gutter and associated drainage improvements as well as the extension of the existing eastbound left turn lane on State Route 120/Duluth Highway are included in the scope of work.

The projects are funded by the 2017 SPLOST program.

Order library books mailed to your home

Mailbox books is a by-request service for Gwinnett County Public Library homebound customers who are unable to visit the library due to age, disability, chronic illness, or a temporary health condition. With this service, customers can either request specific titles and formats or let librarians choose materials based on the customer's personal preferences. County provides help to people in need

Gwinnett County is providing community navigators to guide people in need through the sometimes complicated process of finding and acquiring resources, services, and assistance from nonprofits and other charitable organizations. The navigators are part of a program called OneStop 4 HELP and can be contacted by email at OneStopHelp@GwinnettCounty.com, by phone at 770.822.8850, and soon in person at OneStop facilities in Norcross, Buford, and Centerville.

Gwinnett residents can visit GwinnettOneStop.com to complete an assistance request form to identify a variety of critical needs. The assistance offered includes employment, food, housing and shelter, income support, legal consultation, mental and behavioral health, substance use, transportation, and utilities.
