County awarded SMART grant for safety improvements

Gwinnett was awarded a \$1 million Strengthening Mobility and Revolutionizing Transportation grant from the United States Department of Transportation.

To ensure Gwinnett is the preferred community where everyone thrives, Gwinnett Transportation will use the grant to examine safety and mobility technological solutions — such as focused lighting and warnings — for all roadway users along Singleton Road. Funding will also be used to update the County's Connected Vehicle Technology Master Plan, which previously identified smart corridor deployment.

Senator Reverend Warnock, Senator Jon Ossoff, and Representative Lucy McBath supported the County in securing the federal funding to upgrade its transportation infrastructure. The SMART Grants Program provides grants for projects that improve transportation efficiency and safety through advanced smart community technologies and systems.

Assessors' Office will conduct onsite property field visits

Gwinnett Board of Assessors appraisal staff conduct routine field visits to maintain accurate appraisal data as part of the County's annual review process. Representatives from Gwinnett, LMC, or Tyler Technologies verify existing or new construction, measure exteriors, and take photographs. Although no contact or involvement is needed, appraisers will carry identification and announce their presence at the property before beginning a review. Burn ban in effect through September 30

To protect air quality, the state Environmental Protection Division is imposing a metro-wide burn ban through September 30. All types of outdoor or open burning are prohibited, including burning trees, limbs, and yard waste, as well as the use of air curtain destructors. Don't spill your pills

Many of us have unused, expired, or forgotten medicine in our cabinets. To get rid of these medications, you might be tempted to flush them down your toilet. However, that can negatively impact wastewater treatment or even disrupt the function of your septic system. Follow these helpful steps to dispose of pharmaceuticals correctly:

- 1. Take drugs out of the original container
- 2. Mix with an undesirable substance such as cat litter or used coffee grounds
- Put the mixture into a sealed plastic bag or container
- 4. Remove any personal information on the empty containers
- 5. Place the container in the trash

Beat the summer heat

The summer season is known for bringing extreme heat to Georgia. Temperatures can easily reach 100 degrees or hotter, which can be especially dangerous to seniors, children, and people with asthma. Limit exposure to the soaring temperatures with these helpful tips:

- Stay hydrated during outdoor activities by drinking cool water
- Wear lightweight, light-colored, and loosefitting clothing
- Protect your head, face, and eyes with a brimmed hat and sunglasses
- Use sunscreen to protect your skin
- When outdoors, look for shaded areas to rest or take breaks
- Consider staying indoors when temperatures increase into the 90s
- Limit outdoor activities to early morning or late evening to avoid the hottest part of the day

SPLOST

Sugarloaf Parkway underpass to receive lighting improvements

The Board of Commissioners will use SPLOST funding to upgrade the lighting at the I-85 and Sugarloaf Parkway underpass to LEDs. LED lights are more energy efficient than the current incandescent lighting, which was installed in 1997 when the interchange was built. The Sugarloaf Community Improvement District will contribute \$30,000 toward the project and the County will contribute the remaining \$165,000, funded by the 2017 Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax program.
