SPLOST: Three new road projects benefit Gwinnett drivers

Three transportation projects funded by the 2005 and 2009 SPLOST programs received construction approvals from the Board of Commissioners on December 15. "In the midst of a recession, we're grateful to have these SPLOST revenues available so we can continue making needed road and safety improvements," said Commission Chairman **Charles Bannister**.

The approval of the construction contract for Section 3A of the **Sugarloaf Parkway Extension** Phase 1 will create a 1.6-mile section of new four-lane highway east of Lawrenceville. This section will extend from Martins Chapel Road to Campbell Road. The contract was awarded to E.R. Snell Contractor, Inc., the lowest of nine bidders at \$15.5 million. This section includes two bridges, one over the Alcovy River, and another as part of the diamond interchange at Campbell Road. The project will also relocate West Campbell Road and build a half-mile Bramlett Shoals Road Connector. Section 3B will take the road from the Campbell Road interchange to State Route 316 and is currently under design. That section will begin construction in 2010.

Section 1 of the Sugarloaf Parkway Extension is nearing completion and will be opened to traffic in early 2010. That section will extend the road from its current end at State Route 20 south of Lawrenceville to a new interchange at New Hope Road. Section 2 is under construction and is expected to be completed in the first half of 2011. That section extends from the New Hope Road interchange to a new interchange at Martins Chapel Road. When completed, the four sections of Phase 1 will extend from State Route 20 to State Route 316 and will provide connectivity between the south Lawrenceville/Grayson area and the Dacula area.

Strickland and Sons Pipeline, Inc. was the lowest of 10 bidders at \$2.2 million to build threequarters of a mile of new roadway with turn lanes and sidewalk near the Georgia Gwinnett College campus. This extension of **Collins Industrial Way** will be built as a two-lane roadway with a center turn lane from University Center Lane to Walther Boulevard, providing an additional access to the college.

The intersection of **Peachtree Industrial Boulevard** and **Abbott's Bridge Road/State Route 120** in Duluth will be improved with the installation of additional turn lanes and sidewalks. The \$2.2 million contract went to Baldwin Paving Co., Inc., the lowest of 12 bidders.

Radon Action Month: Radon mitigation becomes contagious



Peggy Wilson moved to Lawrenceville from Florida in 1997 and, like many transplants, was later diagnosed with asthma.

She pays close attention to things that might cause her asthma to flare up. She is proactive, taking precautions at home to make her life healthier and easier.

A few months ago at a home show in Gwinnett County, Wilson visited the Gwinnett County Extension Services' radon exhibit where she learned about radon, the radioactive gas that is the second leading cause of lung cancer. Afraid radon might affect her asthma condition, she talked with **Ines Beltran**, radon educator, who explained that there is no evidence to show that radon affects an asthma condition, but there is plenty of evidence that proves it causes lung cancer.

Wilson picked up a radon test kit at the exhibit to test her home. The result from the test was 4.1 pCi/L (pico Curies per liter of air), a level higher than the Action Level of 4.0 pCi/L. The Action Level is cited by EPA as the threshold for taking action to lower the radon level in a home. Beltran advised Wilson to do a second test to confirm the first high result. The second results proved to be even higher: 5.1 pCi/L.

Deciding to take action, Wilson contacted Beltran to get information about how to lower the radon level in her house. Beltran explained that opening the windows and sealing cracks in the foundation were not enough to bring the radon level down. She also showed Wilson pictures of a sub-slab mitigation system, explaining that it is the most effective way to lower the radon level in a home and gave her a current list of Georgia radon mitigators certified by the National Environmental Health Association and/or the National Radon Safety Board.

Armed with the list of certified radon mitigators, Wilson called three of them. She interviewed each one, received their written estimates, and compared their proposals and prices. In late September, a certified mitigator installed a mitigation system in her home in just a few hours. Beltran and many curious neighbors were there to observe the process. Beltran shared information about this dangerous gas with Wison's neighbors and they, too, decided to test their homes for radon.

A few days after the system was installed, Wilson did a post-mitigation test and the level was reduced to 0.7 pCi/L. This result shows how efficient and important the mitigation system is in order to lower the levels of this dangerous gas.

Recycle your Christmas tree for county parks

With the holidays quickly coming to an end, many of us will be taking down our decorations and wondering how to dispose of that once-beautiful Christmas tree. The solution is a simple and earth-friendly one: take your live tree to a designated drop-off point for the annual **Bring One for the Chipper** program.

The Gwinnett County Fire and Emergency Services Department, Gwinnett County Parks and Recreation, Gwinnett Clean and Beautiful, Jackson EMC, Georgia Power, and Home Depot have teamed up to help recycle Christmas trees in the county. Every year, Gwinnett residents recycle one out of every three trees in this statewide program. Mulch produced from the trees will be used in Gwinnett County's parks and recreational facilities.

The first step to recycle your tree is to remove all ornaments and the tree stand. Then deliver your live tree to one of the specially-designated drop-off sites. Please do not drop off your flocked live tree (live tree decorated with fake snow) or artificial Christmas tree. Flocked trees require disposal at an inert landfill; artificial trees can be placed with your regular garbage for disposall.

Leaves, grass, and shrub and tree prunings from your yards are also welcome at the drop off sites. Visit Gwinnett Clean and Beautiful's website at **www.gwinnettcb.org** for dates and a list of drop-off locations.

Residents can also place their live trees into a Georgia Power lake, TVA lake, or private pond with the landowner's permission for wildlife purposes. Look up **fish attractor** on the Web for details. Detention ponds are not considered a permissible location, but instead are considered part of the local stormwater drainage system. County ordinances prohibit the use of the stormwater drainage system for the disposal of anything other than rainwater and provide penalties for violations. Visit **www.gwinnettstormwater.com** for more stormwater- related issues.

In light of the holidays, please remember to give a gift to the environment and recycle your Christmas tree.

Sustainable design exhibit features local architects

Technology has transformed the world over the last 50 years, enabling us to live longer, instantaneously communicate with each other across the planet, and explore the tiniest bits of our world and the furthest regions of our solar system. We are only now beginning to recognize that this dizzying speed of technological advancement has resulted in exponential population growth, an insatiable appetite for energy, and an impact on the natural world.

In response to this recognition, markets have created a demand for technological innovation to reduce our impact on the natural world. The Gwinnett Environmental and Heritage Center will usher in the new year with **The Technology of Sustainable Design**, an exhibition about new developments in sustainable design that features the work of Atlanta-based firm Houser Walker Architecture, Timmons Design Engineers, United Renewable Energy Solar Integrators, and Suniva, a world leader in solar cell technology. The exhibition will run from January 9 to February 27.

The Technology of Sustainable Design exhibit will explore how technological innovations are changing the way that our buildings are conceived and constructed. Drawing on examples of designs by Houser Walker Architecture and Timmons Design Engineers, as well as materials from Suniva, the exhibition will not only consider available and emerging technologies that can be incorporated into building design, such as energy-efficient lighting or solar panels, but also explore new applications for evaluating the performance of buildings.

The exhibition will also demonstrate how Suniva's high-efficiency silicon photovoltaic cells result in clean, earth-friendly power generation that architects can incorporate into their designs, and how through the use of predictive modeling and evaluation, Timmons Design Engineers can improve a building's energy performance. United Renewable Energy will explain the local applications of photovoltaics and the importance of high-quality design and installation.

The Technology of Sustainable Design exhibit will show how architects integrate these building and evaluative technologies into a holistic vision that is beautiful, functional, and low-impact.

The **Gwinnett Environmental and Heritage Center** is an ideal location for an exhibition of this scope. Since the Center opened in 2006, it has strived to be an exemplary, high-tech cultural center known for hands-on science exhibits and quality educational programming that inspire visitors to become better stewards of our environment. The 59,000-square-foot science and cultural center nestled on 233 pristine acres is also Gwinnett County's first "green" building.

Steve Cannon, executive director of the Gwinnett Environmental and Heritage Center, said, "We must continually learn and teach that sustainability by design is about maintaining a balance between man and the earth's natural resources in order to sustain a modern culture. This exhibit is a great learning and teaching tool that demonstrates the knowledge, art, and the innovative opportunities of sustainable design. If we fail to

understand this critical mission, then we will fail as a nation of people to make a difference in the quality of life and survival of future generations."
