Happening Around Gwinnett



Proposed 2023 budget focuses on service, sustainability, and preparedness

Chairwoman Nicole Hendrickson [presented her proposed budget](#) on November 15 to guide County government spending for the 2023 fiscal year. The [proposed budget](#) totals \$2.26 billion. It consists of a \$1.77 billion operating budget and a \$488 million capital improvements budget, which includes funds from the County's Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax program. Voters last week opted to extend the County's one-cent SPLOST program for another

six years beginning in April. Read more about the [proposed 2023 budget](#).

The Board of Commissioners will accept public comments at a public hearing Monday, December 5 at 7:00pm at the Gwinnett Justice and Administration Center and [online through December 31](#) before adopting a final budget Tuesday, January 3, 2023.

Get ready for the December 6 runoff election

We have a run-off election for our United States Senator coming up on Tuesday, December 6. From Saturday, November 26 through Friday, December 2, registered voters may vote advance in-person, from 7:00am to 7:00pm at one of Gwinnett's [11 advance voting locations](#). Unlike Election Day, you may vote early at any advance voting location in the county, not at an assigned polling location. All voters who were registered by November 7 can cast their ballot regardless of whether or not they voted in the General Election. Construction underway on County's first themed library



County leaders joined the Gwinnett County Public Library Board of Trustees, Lawrenceville officials, and the Hooper-Renwick Legacy Preservation Committee recently to break ground on the Hooper-Renwick Themed Library. The new library branch will preserve the site that once served as Gwinnett's only public school for African Americans.

The projected \$7.6 million project, funded by the 2017 SPLOST program and nearly \$1.7 million from the city, will incorporate the existing 11,400-square-foot school building into the 25,000-square-foot library. The new library will preserve architectural design elements and honor the legacy of the

former Hooper-Renwick School through exhibits about the school's history.

Gwinnett Police, Fire and Emergency Services to host joint hiring event

Gwinnett [Police](#) and [Fire and Emergency Services](#) are hosting the joint hiring event **Saturday, December 10** from 8:00am to 4:00pm at the Gwinnett County Fire Academy, located at 3608 Braselton Highway in Dacula.



Recruiters from both departments will be on hand to answer questions about various career paths. Successful police candidates may receive conditional job offers. Fire candidates will have an opportunity to complete an orientation, application, background check, PPE (sneakers and long pants required), and an oral interview, typically a two-to-three-hour process altogether. New glass recycling drop-off location now open at E.E. Robinson Park

Gwinnett is expanding its glass recycling program with the opening of a third drop-off glass recycling location at E.E. Robinson Park in Sugar Hill. This is the third location offered through the County's glass recycling program, which has already diverted 102 tons of mixed glass from landfills at existing sites at OneStop Norcross and Pinckneyville Park in Peachtree Corners.

Residents can drop off their clean, empty glass containers at E.E. Robinson Park, located at 885 Level Creek Road in Sugar Hill. The clearly marked drop-off container is accessible from sunrise until 11:00pm unless posted otherwise. Glass dropped off at any of the County's glass recycling locations will be taken to Strategic Materials, Inc., a large glass recycler in the Atlanta area. Acceptable glass items include clear and colored food and beverage bottles and jars.

Voters approve continuation of SPLOST program

Voters approved the renewal of the one-cent Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax, or SPLOST, during the November 8 General Election. SPLOST collections are used to fund capital projects like roads, bridges, parks, fire stations, police precincts, libraries, and more.



Gwinnett voters have approved a series of SPLOST programs that since 1985 have raised more than \$3.9 billion, allowing the County to save more than \$1.9 billion in financing costs compared to issuing bonds. The new program is expected to raise \$1.35 billion over the next six years, 25 percent of which will go to cities. Learn more about the renewed SPLOST program at GwinnettSPLOST.com.

Project RESET 2.0 wraps up after distributing more than \$80 million to renters in need

The portal for Gwinnett County's successful emergency rental and utility assistance program, Project RESET 2.0, is now closed as the County has reached its full commitment. To date, Gwinnett has processed more than \$80 million in financial assistance funded by the federal Emergency Rental Assistance Program, ensuring that more than 17,000 people



in Gwinnett County did not have to face an eviction or utility disconnection.
