Gwinnett County Transit is embracing a new look and a new name – Ride Gwinnett. In January, County leaders and employees gathered for the first look at the new name, logo, and bus design. Embodying the County's brand, Ride Gwinnett will carry and support its vibrant people by connecting them to the places they need to go.

After more than 20 years of service in Gwinnett, the transit system's new look reflects the County's evolving focus on mobility. The rebranding includes the County's buses, bus stop shelters, and signs. To learn more about our local service areas, visit RideGwinnett.com.

Gwinnett earns platinum-level sustainability certification

Gwinnett County continues to uphold its commitment to sustainability, earning recertification as a Green Community at the Platinum Level by the Atlanta Regional Commission. Developed in 2009, the <u>Green Communities Program</u> is a voluntary sustainability certification program that helps local governments implement measures that reduce their environmental

impact through actionable measures.

The recertification recognizes Gwinnett's ongoing commitment to environmental stewardship and leadership in sustainability practices for a stronger, greener community. Gwinnett first earned certification as a Green Community in 2010 and became the first county to be certified at the Platinum Level in 2018.

What's New in District 1

Attend a transit expansion public meeting

Ride Gwinnett, formally Gwinnett County Transit, is hitting the road with three new local routes and two microtransit zones. Residents are invited to learn about the new transit services and share their feedback during an in-person or virtual meeting.

The three local transit routes will service new areas in Snellville, Stone Mountain, Buford, and Suwanee and provide extended coverage in Lawrenceville, Lilburn, and Duluth. New service also includes microtransit, which will allow residents to



request Ride Gwinnett from a mobile application and go to their destination within the zones of Snellville and Lawrenceville.



SPLOST-funded upgrades enhance accessibility and mobility

The County will install new bleachers with elevated and accessible seating and ramps at the Shorty Howell Park multipurpose field. The old bleachers will be demolished. The cost of the project is \$235,000 and is funded by the 2014 SPLOST program.

To encourage pedestrian safety, James Road and Lawrenceville Highway will get new sidewalks. The sidewalks will connect neighborhoods to nearby businesses. The

upgrade also includes curb, gutter and drainage improvements. Various SPLOST programs will foot the bill at a cost of \$1,047,467. Meanwhile, a proposed traffic and mobility study will review ways to travel around the Gwinnett Place Mall area. The County will split the cost of the study with the Gwinnett Place Community Improvement District, with the county's contribution of \$37,500 coming from the 2017 SPLOST program.
