
Hello!

Gwinnett partners with library and GCPS to provide summer meals for kids

Gwinnett now has 20 locations countywide where children 18 years old and younger can pick up free grab-and-go breakfasts and lunches, thanks to a partnership between Gwinnett County, Gwinnett County Public Schools, and the Gwinnett County Public Library. Parents can pick up nutritious meals for their children at the locations to take home or the children can pick up their own meals. The meals, which consist of food

Gwinnett Police announce new Text to 911 capability

The Gwinnett County Police Department rolled out Text to 911 capability June 1, giving residents an alternate way to contact police in emergency situations. The best, fastest, and most reliable method to contact 911 in an emergency is to call and speak to a dispatcher, but there are times or situations that can make calling 911 difficult. Text to 911 is intended primarily for use in three emergency scenarios:

- For an individual who is deaf, hard-of-hearing, or has a speech disability
- For someone who is in a situation where it is not safe to place a voice call to 911
- A medical emergency that renders the person incapable of speech




Remember, call if you can; text if you can't.

Enjoy your parks safely!

Residents are encouraged to enjoy the outdoors for exercise and mental and physical health, while following social distancing guidelines recommended by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Here are some things to know before you go:

- Park hours are modified from sunrise to sunset
- Water fountains are closed; bring your own water to stay hydrated
- Maximum capacity of 25 at any amenity such as pavilions, basketball courts, sand volleyball courts, playgrounds, skate parks, or ball fields
- Use a "Leave No Trace" mentality. Bring a suitable trash bag and take everything out to help protect others

Fire and Emergency Services offers virtual classes

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, Gwinnett County Fire and Emergency Services is offering its Fire

Prevention and Life Safety Digital Learning Programs online. Those interested in baby-sitting safety can sign up for the Safe Sitter course, which is set for July 11 from 9:00am to 4:00pm. Safe Sitter will prepare students in grades 6 to 8 to be safe when they're home alone, watching younger siblings, or babysitting. Using games and role-playing, the instructor-led class will teach CPR, first aid, and rescue skills as well as child care and business skills.

To receive their course completion certificate, students must demonstrate their knowledge in a hands-on assessment on July 18 from 9:00am to 11:00am and from 1:00pm to 3:00pm at Gwinnett Fire Headquarters.
