Since my last newsletter, I've participated in Read Across America Day at Kanoheda Elementary - what a joyful experience, spoken at Buford/North Gwinnett Rotary lunch, and spent some time "on the grounds" meeting and greeting staff in our Gwinnett County Police, Department of Water Resources, Planning and Development, and Sheriff's departments.

I also attended our Fire and Emergency Services Promotion and Graduation Ceremony, Community Healthcare Roundtable, and two poignant engagements- Partnership Gwinnett's Star (Top Students and Educators) luncheon and the 2019 Valor Awards, which honors and recognizes Gwinnett County public safety professionals who conduct heroic feats while serving their community. In addition, I got to participate in the Break-Through ceremony for HomeFirst Gwinnett's major renovation for its future homeless assessment center.





Last, but not least, I was honored to receive the Social Action award from the Rho Kappa Lambda chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity during the chapter's annual Martin Luther King Jr. Unity Breakfast and Diversity Awards Program.

Policywise, our Board of Commissioners as a whole approved many items through our various departments, such as contracts for the installation, inspection, maintenance and repair of doors and windows for multiple departments, the repair and resurfacing of outdoor sports courts, and the mowing and trimming of landscaped roadsides along public sidewalks. We also approved the purchase of public safety equipment necessary to transport fire personnel and other

emergency equipment and to update outdated systems used to maintain the safety and security of our community. We took action to move forward with extending Sugarloaf Parkway between State Route 316 and I-85, and I've made several District 4 appointments to the Airport Authority, Gwinnett Transit Advisory Board, Water and Sewerage Authority, Recreational Authority, and the Historical Preservation Board.

All of these meaningful opportunities reflect how we are all vibrantly connected throughout our very impactful county.

What to know about your Annual Notice of Assessment

The Tax Assessor's Office sends our assessment notices every year to inform property owners about the value of their taxable property. This isn't a tax bill, but it includes an estimate of taxes that could be owed based on the previous year's millage rates and exemptions. If you disagree with the assessed value of your property, you can appeal the notice value within 45 days from the date on the notice. For more information, you can visit www.gwinnett-assessor.com.

Annual outdoor burn ban begins May 1

The Gwinnett County Department of Fire and Emergency Services would like to remind residents that a ban on outdoor open burning is in place annually from May 1 through September 30. The Georgia Environmental Protection Division imposes a ban on outdoor open burning to comply with Federal Clean Air Regulations. During the summer months in Georgia, the ozone in the air we breathe can reach unhealthy levels.

The following types of outdoor open burning are banned:

The outdoor open burning ban prohibits the burning of yard and land clearing debris during the
months of May through September. This includes a ban on the use of air curtain destructors for
land clearing.

Remember to avoid distracted driving

Since the new hands-free law went into effect last year, law enforcement agencies, including Gwinnett, are seeing a decrease in accidents related to distracted driving. In District 4, there has been an overall decrease in traffic accidents from last year. April is Distracted Driving Awareness Month, which reminds drivers to put their phones away, stay off the touchscreens, and just drive. Here are a few tips to follow to stay safe while driving:



- Make a habit to program your GPS, place calls or send texts before starting the car.
- Put your phone somewhere that you can't peek at is, and silence notifications that will tempt you to check your phone while driving.
- Use an app that allows you to block messages or send an automatic message while driving.
- If a phone call or text must be answered, pull over to the side of the road to respond or allow a passenger to respond to you.
- Most importantly, be patient; no text or phone call is worth your safety
