Greetings V.I.C.s (Very Important Citizens):

In July, 41 diverse Gwinnett County emerging leaders and I who represent a wide array of business, education, government, nonprofit, healthcare sectors in our county graduated as “The Most Resilient Class” ever from an 11-month Leadership Gwinnett Program. We are truly ready to make a positive impact in our local communities.

With the passing of the Honorable John Lewis, civil rights leader and champion of fighting for equal rights for all, I requested and read a proclamation: “declaring that his birth date of February 21 will henceforth be known in Gwinnett County as John Lewis Day in honor of the memory of the Honorable Congressman John Lewis, an exceptional public servant and civil rights icon.”



Lewis once said, “You are a light. You are the light. Never let anyone – any person or any force – dampen, dim or diminish your light. Study the path of others to make your way easier and more abundant,” and this was a clear cut message that we reciprocated in actions during my most recent District 4 **#MoreThanImpact Summit**. The focus of this event was on young adults and their concerns regarding policing reforms, healthcare disparities, and addressing systemic social, racial, and judicial inequities. The pandemic has forced us to get creative with hosting special events. Meanwhile, our Board of Commissioners as a whole recently took action on many important initiatives:

- Appointed Don Gravitt, Alex Velker, John Butler, and Brandon Harris to the Upper Ocmulgee River Resource Conservation and Development Council Inc.
- Appointed Peg Murray to the Gwinnett Animal Control Hearing Board
- Accepted a \$10,000 grant from the Petco Foundation to assist Gwinnett County Animal Welfare with providing low or no-cost vaccinations, sterilizations, and well as nutrition assistance
- Accepted \$36,999.54 in grant funds from the Georgia Trauma Commission - EMS Trauma Related Equipment Grant for the reimbursement of any trauma related equipment, which will be used to reimburse the purchase of binder lifts and non-contact infrared thermometers
- Approved a contract with Everlast Construction Group LLC to construct the Gwinnett County Entrepreneur Center
- Ratified an employment agreement with Maria B. Woods, Deputy County Administrator and Chief Financial Officer
- Ratified an employment agreement with Buffy J. Alexzulian, Director of Financial Services

- Ratified an employment agreement with Vicki L. Casella, Director of Human Resources
- Ratified an employment agreement with Dorothy A. Parks, Director of Information Technology Services and Chief Information Officer
- Ratified an employment agreement with Michael B. West, Director of Police Services/Chief of Police

Board considering millage rate rollback

The Gwinnett County Board of Commissioners will adopt the 2020 millage rate **Tuesday, August 18 at 2:00pm** in the Gwinnett Justice and Administration Center Auditorium, located at 75 Langley Drive in Lawrenceville. Commissioners are considering a rate of 6.95 mills for the County's General Fund. This rollback rate means that the General Fund portion of the tax bill will not increase. Required notices for the millage rate adoption will be published in the county's legal organ Sunday, August 9.



Commissioners also will consider millage rates for Police, Fire and Emergency Services, Development and Code Enforcement, and Recreation funds. Learn more about the proposed millage rates [here](#).



Census self-response deadline approaching

The Census Bureau recently released an updated timeline announcing that self-responses will end after September 30. Remember, census data determines our representation in government, receipt of federal funding, and future planning for community resources like schools, hospitals, and roads.

Currently, just over two-thirds of Gwinnett's households have completed the questionnaire. Are you part of that final third?
