Board of Commissioners adopts \$1.84 billion budget for 2020

The Gwinnett County Board of Commissioners recently adopted a \$1.84 billion budget for fiscal year 2020 that addresses a broad spectrum of areas.

The adopted 2020 budget is a 1.1 percent increase compared to last year's budget. It consists of a \$1.44 billion operating budget and \$401 million capital improvement budget, which includes funds from the County's SPLOST program.

The approved budget adds 30 more master police officer positions as well as funding for an 11th Superior Court judge, District Attorney and Administrative Office of the Courts staffing, and supplementary sheriff's deputies for courtroom security.

The budget will also fund equipping the recently constructed alternate E-911 center to provide extra security and support to the main E-911 center. The budget includes money to help address homelessness by providing hotel/motel vouchers for emergency shelter providers and completing the buildout of the Norcross Assessment Center to provide homeless shelter beds there.

The fiscal plan for 2020 sets aside funding for the Gwinnett Entrepreneur Center to aid small business startups by providing resources and services, such as physical space, education, and networking connections. Money will also be allocated to continue the Infinite Energy Center Expansion and develop the Water Tower @ Gwinnett for water-related research and training.

County offices closed for MLK holiday

All Gwinnett County government offices, with the exception of those operations required for the comfort and safety of residents, will be closed **January 20** for the Martin Luther King Jr. holiday. Offices will reopen **January 21**.

Martin Luther King Jr. Day is not a trash and recycling holiday for solid waste providers in unincorporated Gwinnett County, so trash and recycling collections are scheduled as normal. Residents who live in a city should contact their city to find out if trash and recycling will be delayed due to the holiday.

Recycle your Christmas tree at Bring One for the Chipper

Recycle your live Christmas tree by dropping it off at one of many locations around Gwinnett through **January 20** as part of the annual Bring One for the Chipper event. Recycling your Christmas tree is easy and saves precious landfill space.

Share your ideas at a Transit Review Committee meeting



With Gwinnett County expected to continue rapid growth through 2040 and beyond, the need for a robust transit system will become even more critical. To analyze Gwinnett's future needs and recommend ways to address those needs, the Board of Commissioners established the Gwinnett Transit Review Committee earlier this year.

The committee, made up of 13 residents representing different walks of life, is weighing different transit scenarios as they try to balance cost, coverage, and service with combinations of heavy rail, bus rapid transit, buses, and vans. When they're finished,

the Transit Review Committee will make recommendations to the Board of Commissioners. The next TRC meeting is set for **January 23 from 6:00pm to 8:00pm** in Conference Room C at the Gwinnett Justice and Administration Center. Georgia DOT, Gwinnett County studying improvements to I-85

Georgia DOT and Gwinnett County are partnering to conduct a Comprehensive Corridor Study along I-85. The study area is roughly 18 miles long and is primarily located within Gwinnett County. The study will propose solutions to reduce congestion, enhance traffic operations, and improve safety in this area. Through collaboration with stakeholders and the public, a wide range of potential solutions will be identified. These alternatives will be analyzed and the recommendations will be developed for implementation. Public feedback is an important part of the study so the I-85 study team created a survey so you can tell them what you think and help them better understand issues that are important to you. U.S. Census Bureau gearing up for 2020 count

In mid-March, the Census Bureau will begin sending invitations to take the census to every household in America. You can respond online, by phone, or by mail. For the first time, you can take the census online, or you can take it by phone, or by mail. In May, census takers will visit homes that haven't responded, and in December 2020, the bureau will issue a report to Congress and the president. Learn more about the upcoming census at 2020Census.gov.

Census counts shape legislative and congressional districts, how federal and state resources are distributed (more people means more resources and services), and influence critical policy decisions. Census results are also used in business decisions and academic studies that can affect your community.

The census is safe, secure, and confidential. Also, it is illegal to share personal information disclosed in the census. The information can only be used to produce statistics. Help us ensure #GwinnettCounts!
