

January is National Radon Action Month

Radon is a radioactive gas that is invisible, tasteless, and odorless. It occurs naturally throughout the world as a result of the normal decay of traces of uranium existing within the earth's crust. It migrates to the earth's surface through rock, soil, and water. Radon further decomposes and releases low-dose radiation once it moves into the atmosphere. The particles may attach to dust and be inhaled if the gas enters your home.

While radon is present throughout the U.S., exposure varies widely. It could be present in dangerous levels in your home. The only way to know if your home contains radon is to conduct a radon detection test. Inexpensive do-it-yourself test kits are available through many home improvement stores. Test kits are available from the Gwinnett Extension.



Breathing the radioactive particles produced by radon is a major cause of lung cancer, second only to smoking. However, exposure to radon is preventable. If high levels are confirmed in your home,

corrections can be made with simple, cost-effective remediation methods.

Constitutional officers announce statewide scholarship

The Constitutional Officers of Gwinnett County, Sheriff Butch Conway, Clerk of Courts Richard Alexander, Probate Judge Christopher Ballar and Tax Commissioner Richard Steele, in partnership with the Constitutional Officers Association of Georgia, are pleased to announce a scholarship contest for Georgia high school seniors and current college undergraduates.

This year, the association will offer three scholarships, one each in the amounts of \$1,500, \$1,000, and \$500. To be eligible for this year's scholarship, students must be residents of Georgia, graduate from high school by the spring of 2015, or be enrolled in an accredited Georgia college or university. Students must also seek a degree in a field related to government/law enforcement, political science, accounting, finance, business, or pre-law.

To apply, applicants must submit a typed, 1,000-word essay that answers the question "How can the local governing authority and the four local constitutional officers in your county partner together to provide a more efficient and cost-effective government?" and provide a letter of acceptance or enrollment from an institution of higher education, a copy of a college application or transcript to provide verification of degree field, and the COAG scholarship application.
