Reminder: low cost spay/neuter clinic

The Society of Humane Friends of Georgia is hosting a public vaccination clinic for pets at the Gwinnett County Animal Welfare and Enforcement Center, 884 Winder Highway in Lawrenceville on Saturday, February 22 from 11:00am to 2:00pm.

Vaccines are \$10. Microchipping will also be available for \$20. Cash payments are accepted only. Dogs must be on a leash and cats must be in carriers. Proceeds from the clinic will benefit the Gwinnett County Sheriff's Office Operation Second Chance Jail Dogs program and the



Society of Humane Friends outreach program and lost-cost spay/neuter clinic.

Walk Georgia enrollment is open!

Walk across the state of Georgia - virtually - by signing up for the University of Georgia/Gwinnett Cooperative Extension Walk Georgia program. A 12-week program beginning February 2, Walk Georgia helps you increase your physical activity and develop the get-moving habit.



Sign up between February 1 and March 10 at www.walkgeorgia.org. Then log on to report everything that gets you moving. Anything from a walk around the block to gardening or playing a game of pickup basketball counts. Logging all your activities adds up the miles, allowing you to "unlock" Georgia counties and take an online tour through our great state. April 26 is the last day for logging your miles.

The program is completely free and you may register as an individual or a four-person team. Either way, you'll have fun as you get fit! Gwinnett County Animal Welfare and Enforcement has been accepted

and is officially a competitor in the 2014 ASPCA Rachael Ray \$100K Challenge. The \$100K Challenge is a contest in which 50 shelters across the country compete to break their own records saving the lives of animals.



Throughout the months of June, July, and August 2014, each competing shelter must save more dogs, cats, puppies, and kittens than they did during the same three months in 2013. Gwinnett County Animal Welfare and Enforcement is the only challenger in the state of Georgia, and many animals will benefit from this challenge. More details will be available closer to the competition dates, so keep an eye out.

Now is the time to prune roses



With spring right around the corner, now is a good time to prune your roses. Pruning encourages new growth and removes the dead or diseased parts, and improves the overall shape of rose bushes. If you have climbing roses that bloom in early spring, wait until after they flower to prune. Make sure pruning tools are sharp and clean.
