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

County offices closed for Christmas and New Year's holidays

All Gwinnett County government offices, with the exception of those operations required for the comfort and safety of residents, will be closed **December 23** and **26** for the Christmas holiday and reopen on **December 27**. Offices will also be closed **January 2** for the New Year's Day holiday and reopen on **January 3**. A Magistrate Court judge will be available at the Gwinnett County Detention Center during the Christmas and New Year's holidays.

Trash and recycling collections are scheduled as normal during the County's Christmas and New Year's holiday closings. In addition, hauler call centers will be open. Residents can <u>search for their solid waste hauler</u> to find their hauler's contact information. Residents who live in a city should contact their trash and recycling provider to find out if collections will be delayed due to the holiday.



**Drop off your Christmas tree for recycling** 

Once the holidays are over, don't forget to recycle your Christmas tree. You can drop off your live, undecorated tree at one of the convenient locations between December 26 and January 15 in

Gwinnett County.



The trees will be chipped at Gwinnett Clean and Beautiful's Bring One for the Chipper event on January 21 at Bethesda Park located at 225 Bethesda Church Road in Lawrenceville, near the soccer fields. The mulch will be used for County parks, roadway landscaping, and facilities.

There's still time to comment on the 2017 budget proposal



December 31 is the last day to <u>submit your online comments</u> about the proposed 2017 budget.

Gwinnett Commission Chairman Charlotte Nash presented a proposed \$1.56 billion budget for fiscal year 2017 to the Board of Commissioners during a briefing on November 15. Six county residents and business people served on Nash's budget review committee. After hearing presentations from elected officials and department directors in late August and early September, the group studied departmental business plans, budget needs, and revenue projections to make recommendations for the 2017

Remember fireworks safety during New Year's celebrations

Gwinnett County's firefighters encourage residents to attend a professional show instead of using consumer fireworks during the New Year's celebration. The improper use of fireworks could cause significant bodily harm and property damage. The following are important safety tips to remember when choosing to include fireworks to help ring in the New Year:

- Always purchase fireworks from a licensed and reputable vendor.
- Read the directions carefully and inspect the fireworks device for any defects.
- Keep a bucket of water, garden hose, and portable fire extinguisher close at hand. Be prepared to use the fire extinguisher or garden hose to douse small fires.
- Ignite fireworks outdoors in an open area away from buildings, vehicles, vegetation, or any other combustible material.
- Ignite only one fireworks device at a time and use a grill (punk) lighter or fireplace lighter. Remember to keep a safe distance between yourself and the fireworks device.
- Always ignite fireworks on a firm, flat surface.



- Never give fireworks to a child, no matter the age. Children should be kept away from any fireworks area.
- Never attempt to fix or re-ignite a malfunctioning fireworks device. Instead, discard them safely by soaking them in a bucket of water.
- Before going to bed at night, remember to inspect the area where fireworks are used.
- Store unused fireworks in a cool, dry place out of the reach of small children or pets and away from open flame.
