Stay safe while using fireworks this Independence Day

Although fireworks are legal in Georgia, many are dangerous and Fire and Emergency Services urges residents to attend a professional fireworks show instead of staging one at home. For those using personal fireworks, firefighters offer these tips to avoid a potentially life-changing accident:

- Read the directions carefully and inspect the device for any defects
- Keep a bucket of water, garden hose, and fire extinguisher close by
- Never give fireworks to a child and keep children away from any firework area
- Never attempt to fix or re-ignite a malfunctioning device. Instead, discard it safely by soaking it in a bucket of water
- Before going to bed at night, remember to inspect the area where fireworks were used
- Never handle fireworks while impaired by drugs or alcohol
- Don't bring your pet to a fireworks display

July is **National Park and Recreation Month** and the County's Parks and Recreation team has several events to help get you outdoors for play, relaxation, and rejuvenation.



Records unit opening at three precincts

Gwinnett County Police Department Records Unit will be reopening at three police precincts in an effort to make records more readily available to the public.

Beginning Monday, **July 1**, Records Unit staff will be available in the lobbies of the West Precinct, South Precinct, and Central Precinct. Visitors may obtain copies of: police reports, accident reports, and criminal histories and begin the application process for record restrictions. Gwinnett Animal Shelter offers July specials, including Free Fridays



Gwinnett Animal Welfare will host IndePETdence Week July 1 through July 6 with \$4 adoption fees. The shelter will be closed Thursday, July 4 and will reopen Friday, July 5 with the return of **Free Fridays**. All adoption fees will be waived on all pets each Friday throughout the month of July.

All pets adopted at the shelter have been vaccinated, neutered, microchipped, and are ready to go to their new home. Dogs typically cost \$45 to adopt, and cats typically cost \$30. The Gwinnett Animal Welfare center is located at **884 Winder Highway** in **Lawrenceville**. Keep mosquitoes at bay this summer

Don't let mosquitoes drive you indoors. To reduce the mosquito population around your home, the Department of Water Resources, UGA Extension Gwinnett, and the Gwinnett County Health Department recommend:

- Cleaning gutters to eliminate breeding areas
- Removing any standing water in trash can lids, pet feeding bowls, and flowerpot saucers
- Replacing water in birdbaths frequently
- Keeping tight-fitting screens on windows and doors



Be sure to register early at your child's new school



Our friends at Gwinnett County Public Schools asked us to share a reminder that if you're new to Gwinnett and need to register your child for school or if your child is changing schools due to a move, summer is the best time to register.

All Gwinnett County Public Schools locations will register students from 9:00am to 4:00pm on July 9, 11, 16, 18, 23, and 25. Start [registration online](#), then go to the school to submit required records and information to complete registration on designated days. The school year starts Monday, August 5.

There are many acceptable materials and you can bring up to five containers. This event is hosted by Gwinnett Clean & Beautiful and the Gwinnett County
