Gwinnett Police holds community meeting at Universal Church

Chief J.D. McClure and members of his command staff met with residents at The Universal Church in Norcross for a community meeting on March 9. Several members of our Hispanic community were in attendance to ask the chief and panelists about community policing and investigation processes involving missing persons, gun violence, drugs, and gangs.

Chief McClure listened to residents' concerns and answered questions regarding the confidentiality of ongoing investigations.

He also assured the public that officers are constantly working on the cases.



Misinformation breeds distrust, and Chief McClure reassured guests that the department is transparent in all its dealings. He also welcomed the opportunity to answer questions and alleviate misunderstandings regarding certain cases in the news. The meeting helped improve the lines of communication with our Hispanic community, and we look forward to hosting more meetings to further bridge the gap between Gwinnett Police and our residents. We are committed to unbiased and compassionate policing in our county.

Firearm Safety Classes highlight firearm security practices and terminology



Gwinnett residents will be able to learn guidelines and best practices for safe gun handling from local law enforcement personnel.

The Gwinnett Police Community Affairs Section will offer firearm safety and security classes to the community on Wednesdays, April 12, April 26, and May 10 at 6:30pm at the Gwinnett County Police Training Center at 854 Winder Highway in Lawrenceville.

Classes will highlight firearm security, terminology, and how to properly store firearms to keep children safe. Youth who plan to attend must be accompanied

by a parent or guardian. Residents are prohibited from bringing their own guns to class.

Drop off expired prescriptions at Drug Take Back Event

On Saturday, April 22 from 10:00am to 2:00 pm, residents can drop off tablets, capsules, patches, and other forms of prescription drugs at Police Headquarters and all precincts. Gwinnett Police is partnering with the Drug Enforcement Administration for National Drug Take Back, an initiative that allows residents to properly dispose of unused or expired prescription medications. Safety Tip of the Month: School Zone Safety

Each year, approximately 56 million children travel from their homes to attend school by walking, biking, and taking the bus. Our goal is for motorists to comply with the set speed limits to help keep students safe while traveling to and from school. Speed enforcement cameras are installed and in use at the following locations:

Anderson Livsey Elementary School

- Archer High School
- Corley Elementary School
- Duncan Creek Elementary School
- Graves Elementary School
- Lanier Middle School/White Oak Elementary School

Speed limits during flashing light times range from 25 miles per hour to 35 miles per hour. Visit
