Citizens Police Academy graduates feel safe and proud to call Gwinnett home

Congratulations to the 44th graduating class of Citizens Police Academy! We constantly make improvements to the Gwinnett Police Citizens Academy curriculum based on current events and community needs.

Citizens Police Academy participants received Narcan training and are equipped to administer the nasal spray to individuals experiencing an opioid overdose. The increase in fentanyl overdoses is a real public health epidemic with lethal consequences, and we want to make sure we do our part to help



educate and equip residents with the necessary tools to help prevent catastrophic outcomes.

All Gwinnett police officers are equipped to respond to an overdose, and we continue to partner with Gwinnett, Newton, and Rockdale Public Health to provide training and free Narcan nasal spray kits to our police academy participants so we can save more lives.

After going through the academy, graduates shared a deeper sense of security and said they are proud to call Gwinnett home. ### Police leadership engage with the community

Gwinnett Police leadership have been engaging with residents at a variety of events this fall. Chief J.D. McClure, the Gwinnett Police Citizens Advisory Board, and Central Precinct Commander Major Terry Werho hosted community meetings last month for diverse audiences: Hispanic residents, college students, and business owners in the Gwinnett Place Mall area.

Gwinnett Technical College students asked Chief McClure and members of the Police Citizens Advisory Board a variety of questions that included our response to sex trafficking cases, how we collaborate with code enforcement, the Georgia Constitutional Carry Act, college internship opportunities with Gwinnett Police, succession planning and recruitment, and overall community

Business owners in the Gwinnett Place Community Improvement District spoke with Major Werho with the help of translation support in Korean and Vietnamese to address a string of commercial burglaries near the Central Precinct. Major Werho reassured business owners that officers are constantly patrolling the area, especially during the early morning hours when thieves tend to strike. Business owners are encouraged to invest in security cameras and contact the Community



Affairs Section to conduct a Commercial Security Survey to address any blind spots and prevent further burglaries.

While it can be the most wonderful time of the year, it can also create opportunities for criminals. Be aware of your surroundings and stay safe! Take extra precautions to protect yourself when shopping during the holiday season.



### Follow these safety tips:

- Don't leave valuables including wallets, phones, money, or shopping bags visible in your vehicle
- If you are unable to remove valuables and purchases from your car, properly secure them in your trunk
- Park in a well-lit area
- Ask store security to walk you to your car if you feel uncomfortable
- · If you suspect someone is following you, report it immediately
