Black History Month Spotlight: Assistant Chief Everett Spellman



In celebration of Black History Month, we shine a spotlight on Training Division Commander Assistant Chief Everett Spellman. He began his career with Gwinnett Police 26 years ago as a member of the 40th police academy. He has risen through the ranks, demonstrating his expertise in specialized units, including the community response team, gangs, crime suppression, DUI, K-9, and SWAT teams. Assistant Chief Spellman advocates for fair hiring practices, mentorship programs, and unbiased policing. His commitment to justice extends beyond the badge, ensuring that all individuals are treated with respect and dignity.

"Chief Spellman is a genuine and fearless leader. Not only will he lead you in the right direction, but he will be right there on the front line with you. As an

Assistant Chief, he's one of the first to arrive in the building and the last to leave. Chief Spellman's character and leadership showed me, a young black man, that it's okay to look like us and achieve such greatness. He makes me feel like I can be the chief of the Gwinnett Police Department one day," said Recruit Training Instructor Fed Joseph.

Assistant Chief Spellman received several medals and awards for honorable and distinguished service. He earned a master's degree in public safety administration from Columbus State University. He has served on local boards and committees, including the Gwinnett Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging Launch Committee in 2023. Aside from his primary role as a peace officer, Spellman is most proud of Feed My Sheep Ministries SC, a nonprofit organization he created to support children and families in need in his hometown in South Carolina.

As we celebrate Black History Month, let us celebrate Assistant Chief Spellman's contributions and honor the legacy of black leaders who have shaped our history. Peace officers are not only guardians of the law but also stewards of hope. Together, we can build bridges, break down barriers, and forge a path toward a more just and equitable tomorrow. Youth Safety and Mental Health leaders share latest data and resources for support

Many behaviors that can affect a person's health and well-being later in life start during adolescence — the phase of life that ranges from 10 to 19 years old. This group also experiences many developmental changes that can affect their physical and mental health.

Firearm deaths among U.S. children and adolescents have steadily increased with widening disparities. Guns remain the leading cause of death among American children and teens.

On January 25, the Gwinnett Police Community Affairs Section participated in a Youth Safety & Mental Health Community



Discussion in conjunction with the Gwinnett County District Attorney's Office and GUIDE, Inc. There were 68 attendees in person and 281 viewers via <u>live stream on Facebook</u>. Panelists, including our own Lt. Acevedo, a United States Marine Corps veteran who has spent more than 27 years in law enforcement, discussed the mental health crisis in Gwinnett and surrounding counties, firearm safety and storage, and how to access local programs addressing mental health. The Community Affairs team was one of 14 vendors at the event providing free gun locks; residents also received Narcan kits and gun safes.

By fostering open lines of communication and providing resources to educate parents about the signs and risks youth are facing, we can empower adults to play an active role. Parenting workshops and community forums are just a few ways in which we can collectively support families in navigating these complex challenges. Let's continue to invest in our youth by providing them with positive opportunities and creating supportive environments. We can empower young people to make better choices and build a brighter future for themselves and our community.
