# Board of Commissioners adopts millage rate for 2023

On Tuesday, the Board of Commissioners adopted the same general fund millage rate as last year, 6.95 mills. Property taxes are based on millage rates set by county government, the schools and cities. One mill equals a dollar tax per thousand dollars of assessed property value. Most homeowners in Gwinnett benefit from the Value Offset Exemption, which means they will not see an increase in the county government portion of their tax bill.

Before holding the vote, the commissioners took public comments at three public hearings and online. Details on the <u>2023 millage rates</u> and additional information about how property taxes are calculated are available on the County's website.

# Dog adoptions suspended at the animal shelter until July 26



The <u>Bill Atkinson Animal Welfare Center</u> has suspended dog adoptions and dog intakes through **Wednesday**, **July 26** as a proactive measure against a canine viral infection. Pet owners will still be able to reclaim any lost pets – including dogs – during business hours. Cat adoptions are still available, and the center will still intake cats and injured dogs.

### Stay safe by the pool with these essential tips

Having an at-home swimming pool can be convenient during the summer, but it could also increase the risk of children drowning.

Before you dive in, refresh yourself on these pool safety tips:

- Lock all gates and doors to limit access to backyard swimming pools
- Be sure to use a pool cover when the pool is not in use
- All children should be supervised in the pool area
- Separate the deep and shallow ends of the pool with a float-line
- Be sure all rescue equipment is stored in reach
- Post emergency numbers by the telephone
- Cover all drains and vents to prevent entangling of the hair or body
- Designate an adult to watch the children during gatherings

### Summer outdoor burn ban still in place



The annual ban on outdoor open burning is in place until **September 30**. The Georgia Environmental Protection Division has identified outdoor open burning as a significant contributor to the pollutants that form ozone in the air we breathe. The ban prohibits residents and businesses from outdoor burning in accordance with state rules to prevent unhealthy levels of ozone. This is in addition to the year-round ban established by local ordinance on the burning of solid waste or household garbage.
