 - a. Juneteenth Updates
 - i. Board Member Taylor-Crawford shared a presentation of Juneteenth events that took place in the county during the month of June (Document Attached)
6. Old Business
 - a. Approval to change “Article VI: Section 1. Regular Meetings” of HRPB by-laws
 - i. Staff member Cammie Fulmer gave a summary of requirements for changing by-laws and reported that verbiage proposed by the Board at their last meeting had been reviewed and approved by the county lawyer. As the board had given notice at a previous meeting of their intentions to change “Article VI: Section 1. Regular Meetings” and with the proposed verbiage having been reviewed by the county lawyer, board members could proceed with the final vote to approve the change to the by-laws.
 - ii. Approval to change “Article VI: Section 1. Regular Meetings” of HRPB by-laws to read “Regular meetings shall be held at least quarterly, and no more than

monthly. A meeting occurs when a quorum of the Board gathers to either discuss business or any other public matter, to take official action, or to discuss recommendations. All meetings are open to the public and subject to the Georgia Open Meetings and Open Records Laws. Regular meetings for the proceeding twelve months shall be scheduled at the beginning of each calendar year during the first scheduled regular meeting.”

b. Preservation Award Deadlines and Updates

- i. Staff member Cammie Fulmer gave a summary of updated Nomination Form - Preservation Award (Document Attached) and deadlines pertaining to the Preservation Award Ceremony, tentatively scheduled for September 17, 2022.
- ii. Chairwoman Bender enquired whether a subcommittee could be formed to review nomination forms and make recommendations to the Board for approval. Staff member Mark Patterson stated the Board could select a subcommittee of their choosing. It was recommended suggested members for the subcommittee be reviewed and voted on at the next meeting. Board member Howe-Silvers questioned whether the subcommittee would be subject to open records and other official committee rules. Staff member Patterson stated staff will verify the rules regarding subcommittees and report back at the next meeting.
- iii. Discussion took place regarding postponing the Preservation Award Ceremony to later in the year to allow for creation of the subcommittee and additional publicity regarding the award nomination. A preferred date of Thursday, December 15, 2022 in the evening was stated. Staff will review venue availability and report back. Board member Taylor-Crawford requested staff investigate if Nomination Form can be put on Board website, for both print and fillable online.
- iv. Vice Chairman Lambros asked if five awardees need to be voted on by Board members at an official meeting. Staff will review this question with legal and report back at the next meeting.

 - i. Gwinnett County Public Library staff member Kate Delaney presented on an upcoming Charles Hale Exhibition produced in partnership between the Gwinnett Remembrance Coalition and the Gwinnett County Public Library. (Document Attached)

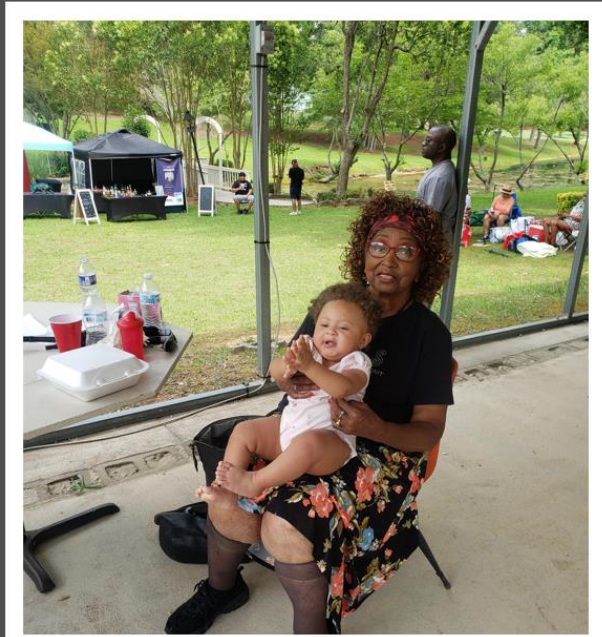
8. Project Updates

- a. Staff member Mark Patterson presented on the following
 - i. Gwinnett Historic Courthouse slate roof replacement
 - ii. Hudson-Nash House renovation
 - iii. Promised Land House restoration
 - 1. Following Patterson's initial report, Board member Taylor-Crawford enquired about 2017 SPLOST monies spent on the project. Patterson discussed how SPLOST dollars are collected over multiple years and stated to date approximately \$630,000 of 2017 SPLOST money has been spent on the Promised Land Project. Chairwoman Bender enquired whether grant money had been applied for. Patterson stated grant monies have been applied for, but have not been granted to date. Board member Taylor-Crawford enquired what next step moving forward on this project are. Patterson's reported the final draft Request For Proposal (RFP) for the house is nearing completion. After RFP goes through bidding process, the project will then move into construction. Patterson stated this will be a multiyear project, currently projected for the house renovation to be completed during a three year period, but with contingencies including weather. Board member Taylor-Crawford asked about stakeholders involvement in the project. Patterson stated stakeholder involvement occurs during the phase after the RFP is awarded. Board member Taylor Crawford enquired on an update of Ruth Abram's consulting work. Patterson stated we are waiting on the final report for this project. Board member Taylor-Crawford asked where the status or timeline of the project can be viewed. Patterson responded this type of information will not be available until RFP process completed and construction contractor on board for this project. Board member Taylor Crawford asked who the project contact is for the Promised Land Project and Patterson responded himself and the Division Director for Project Administration, Glenn Borman. Vice-chair Lambros enquired how stakeholders are chosen. Patterson stated stakeholder are consulted in coordination with county staff and consulting firm and include a variety of residents with an interest in the project. Patterson explained park master planning consultation includes stakeholder engagement such as open public meeting, surveys and steering committees.

Recently Donated/Loaned Artifacts:

Between May and July 2022, 26 artifacts related directly to the historic Hooper-Renwick School were donated. These items are actively being researched and cataloged to determine how they can be used in the interpretation of the Hooper-Renwick School.



38 artifacts related to Mount Calvalry United Methodist Church were accepted into the artifact collection. The history and congeration of this this church is connected to the history of Hooper-Renwick School.



1 artifact was received as a loan from the Gwinnett Historical Society. This late 19th century stroller belonged to the Perry family that once owned and operated a clothing and fashion store in downtown Lawrenceville. This item is already on display in the Gwinnett History Museum as we continue to increase our collection and displays of childhood associated items at the Lawrenceville Female Seminary.



Wooden Cornices removed from the Gwinnett Historic Courthouse and 15 paper documents relating the community on Chandler Road were donated to the collection. The father of the donor was a part of the team that oversaw the restoration of the Gwinnett Historic Courthouse in the 1980s.
