Amendment to July 18, 2022 Minutes 8. Project Updates, iii. Promised Land House Restoration

Following Patterson's initial report, Board member Taylor-Crawford enquired about 2017 SPLOST monies spent on the project. Patterson discussed how SPLOST dollars are collected over multiple years and stated to date approximately \$630,000 of 2017 SPLOST money has been spent on the Promised Land Project. Chairwoman Bender enquired whether grant money had been applied for. Patterson stated grant monies have been applied for, but have not been granted to date. Board member Taylor-Crawford enquired what next step moving forward on this project are. Patterson's reported the final draft Request For Proposal (RFP) for the house is nearing completion. After RFP goes through bidding process, the project will then move into construction. Patterson stated this will be a multiyear project, currently projected for the house renovation to be completed during a three year period, but with contingencies including weather. Board member Taylor-Crawford asked about stakeholders involvement in the project. Patterson stated stakeholder involvement occurs during the phase after the RFP is awarded. Board member Taylor Crawford enquired on an update of Ruth Abram's consulting work. Patterson stated we are waiting on the final report for this project. Board member Taylor-Crawford asked where the status or timeline of the project can be viewed. Patterson responded this type of information will not be available until RFP process completed and construction contractor on board for this project. Board member Taylor Crawford asked who the project contact is for the Promised Land Project and Patterson responded himself and the Division Director for Project Administration, Glenn Borman. Vice-chair Lambros enquired how stakeholders are chosen. Patterson stated stakeholder are consulted in coordination with county staff and consulting firm and include a variety of residents with an interest in the project. Patterson explained park master planning consultation includes stakeholder engagement such as open public meeting, surveys and steering committees.




This is where neighbors became family--- where the dinner table on Sunday was a gathering of people, to eat, to fellowship and where family friends and visitors came together in a safe place...

At War with Nature Exhibit:


Theme: At War With Nature: The Battle to Control Pests in Georgia's Fields, Forests, and Front Yards. Since prehistory, humans have sought to control nature, especially plants and insects. Still, people have also introduced—intentionally and unintentionally—some of the most notorious "pests" of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. This exhibit examines the war against nature as it played out in Georgia's fields, forests, and front yards. Due to an often compulsive urge to eradicate insects and plants viewed as unfavorable, entomologists, chemists, agriculturalists, government officials, and everyday Georgians have contended with the unanticipated ecological and public health consequences. When chemicals failed to live up to their lofty promises, "quarantine" supplanted outright "eradication" both as the preferred approach and ultimate goal. The battle against the "gypsy moth" is one of the country's earliest eradication campaigns, but the stories of the boll weevil and fire ant are probably more familiar to southerners as is kudzu—the most recent "invader." The backstory behind the wars waged against these pests shed light on several complex stories. The use of science to battle nature, the consequences of that struggle, and the growing acceptance of different approaches to control and coexistence are all illuminated in this exhibit. "The At War with Nature exhibition has been adapted from a display originally produced by the Richard B. Russell Library for Political Research and Studies at the University of Georgia."
