



Response Initiatives



Alternative Response Vehicles

- Over 11,000 responses in 2025
- Lower operating and staffing costs
- Faster access in dense areas

Peak-Time Response Units

- Deployed during highest demand (7:00am – 7:00pm)
- Expands capacity when needed, reduces when not
- Supports faster response and unit availability
- Four additional units planned for June
